

Blood Bank Volunteer Need Seen

Mobile Unit Due Here Friday: "Flu" Brings Need of More Donors

Volunteer blood donors will probably be urgently needed at the Hillsboro center Friday if Washington county is to meet its minimum quota of 140 pints of blood. Many of the people originally scheduled for Friday have been disqualified due to the recent "flu" epidemic and eligible donors are asked to visit the center whether they have appointments or not.

Persons having had a cold or the influenza within the past 30 days cannot be accepted for blood donations, according to Mrs. F. Alendroth, county Red Cross blood bank chairman. The rule is rigidly enforced for the protection of the donor and will probably make serious inroads on the number of volunteers eligible Friday.

Volunteers who wish to make a blood donation Friday but who do not have an appointment are asked to come to the donor center at the Masonic temple Friday between the hours of 9:30 a. m. and 12:30 p. m. Although there is no definite assurance that they can be taken, it is very possible that donors without appointments may see the difference between success and failure in meeting the day's quota.

Mrs. Alendroth has advised appointments are urged to be present promptly at the time assigned. If unable to attend, they are asked to notify Mrs. Alendroth by phone at Hillsboro 3612 as soon as possible so that substitute donors may be notified in plenty of time to meet the dietary requirements.

Next visit of the Red Cross mobile unit to the center in Hillsboro has been set for January 31 and appointments are now being made for that date. Many more donors are needed for this visit and volunteers may make appointments now by calling Mrs. Alendroth or contacting the blood bank chairman in their community.

Appointments made in advance assure the volunteer of being taken and of the minimum of delay at the center. Mrs. Alendroth pointed out such arrangements also facilitate the efficiency of the unit and permit the donor to visit the center at the most convenient time.

Eligible donors are urged to make appointments personally rather than awaiting notification of an appointment. Re-donors are not necessarily called every eight weeks and making an appointment personally permits the volunteer to select the most convenient date.

Blood donor center for Washington county is located at the Masonic temple, southeast corner of Second and Lincoln streets opposite the county courthouse, in Hillsboro.

Diet schedule for blood donors: Eat nothing for last hour before donating. During the last six hours eat nothing except (1) black coffee, (2) dry toast, (3) fruit, (4) stewed or fresh fruit, (5) juices. This diet is necessary to render the plasma suitable for use. Donors should wear sleeves that can be easily rolled up.

Aid for Income Taxpayers Set

In addition to the above dates and places in Washington county, the same assistance will be available to taxpayers at the office of the collector of internal revenue, Custom House, Portland, each day until March 15, which is the final day of the filing period.

Grain Crop Shift Seen For County

Production Estimates For 1944 Made Here Under War Food Plan

Trend of Washington county agriculture during 1944 will be away from crops requiring considerable labor and machinery and will be toward grains and other crops bringing the most monetary return with the least requirement of labor and machinery. This was the prediction of county farmers who met Friday in the county court room to hear requests of the war food administration for agricultural production during the coming year.

No production goals were set up in previous years. Members of the county AAA committee, the county agricultural planning committee and interested farmers were called in to consider the crop requirements of the war food administration and then estimate what the probable production during the coming year. Similar estimates are being made in every county of the United States, it was explained. The war food administration will base its plans for armed forces, lend-lease and civilians on these estimates.

Based on present labor, machinery and fertilizer conditions, farmers attending the session agreed on the following expected trends for the coming year as compared with 1943: 20 per cent decrease in the number of cows kept; a 20 per cent decrease in milk production; a 20 per cent decrease in hay production; a 20 per cent decrease in barley; 20 per cent increase in oats; 25 per cent increase in fresh vegetables for market; and 50 per cent decrease in acreage of potatoes. Predictions were also made on many other less important crops.

At the present time, dairy cattle and milk production, farmers pointed out that there were more cows in farms today than usual since many of them, especially in the north, had been kept in the barns for beef. A more favorable market had been expected, but the number of dairy animals and the 10 per cent in hay production would result in a better situation.

Major Burke, Marine Pilot, Dies in Action

BUXTON--Major Delbert W. Burke, 25, has been killed in action somewhere in the South Pacific, according to word received last week by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Burke.

He joined the marine corps in December, 1940, and later trained as a pilot at Pensacola, Fla. He was steadily advanced and on December 1 was promoted from captain to major.

A native of Forest Grove, Major Burke was graduated from Beaverton high school in 1935 and from Oregon State college in 1939.

Major Burke was married to Miss June Clark in Portland in January, 1943. Besides his wife, he is survived by his parents, six sisters and three brothers.

"Infantile paralysis, unfortunately, will strike again and again until research has given us the answers which will lead to final victory. We do not know exactly when or where polio will attack our country this year... but our nation must be ready."

Half of each dollar contributed locally in the current infantile paralysis drive remains in Washington county to aid local polio-miseric sufferers. Brink pointed out that the money is being used for the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis to carry on laboratory research to find the cause, cure and prevention of the dread disease, and to help any community with an epidemic greater than it can finance.

Many Improvements Seen Following War

Post war planning, civic improvements, industry and retail trade activities of the chamber of commerce were discussed at the Tuesday luncheon by committee representatives.

Considerable development in this community can be looked for immediately after the war, according to W. C. Christensen, who reported for the post war planning committee in the absence of Paul Patterson, who is on a business trip to Chicago. Christensen expressed the belief that we could look forward to a much better situation here after the war.

Many Improvements Anticipated

Improvements of all kinds here, including governmental and private, are expected to run around \$1,800,000, Christensen said. This includes a total of \$175,000 to be set up for Hillsboro improvements, plus industrial and business expansion and rehabilitation, new residence construction, schools, utilities, etc. He cited the need for store rehabilitation and new fronts.

If we are going to retain representative government and prevent mass unemployment, post-war planning is essential, Christensen declared. He said we are now stirred by three emotions--(1) Win the war, (2) win the peace, and (3) post war planning. Need for providing employment for the returning service men was stressed.

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Battle of Fourth War Loan Opens

600 Volunteers Start Canvass of County On \$1,741,400 Goal

The army won the battle of North Africa. The navy won the battle of Midway. The marines won the battle of Tarawa. And nearly 600 volunteer workers opened the "Battle of the Fourth War Loan" in Washington county Tuesday morning, determined to reach the \$1,741,400 goal and "win the victory" in the shortest possible time.

Every home in Washington county will be contacted at least once during the drive and given an opportunity to invest in "bonds for victory," according to these organizers.

Outlined by W. C. Christensen and H. L. MacKenzie, co-chairmen of the war finance committee, special emphasis is being given to "B" bonds and a house-to-house canvass of every school district in the county. It is necessary to meet the \$1,741,400 goal set for these securities, the drive leaders declared.

Emblems Planned

Every patriotic home in Washington county will be given the colorful Fourth War Loan emblem given for the purchase of at least one extra \$100 war bond over and above the regular subscription, MacKenzie declared. "It will tell the world that that home is doing its share to back up our valiant fighting men in their relentless attack against our common enemies," he continued.

These men signed up for the "duration" drive, giving their lives. They don't stop because of a single success--they keep on fighting until victory. We on the home front must do the same. We must just because we've won over the top on three drives--we only lend our money and we've got to keep on buying until victory, too!"

Securities Listed

Government securities to meet every buyer's need are offered in the Fourth War Loan. Christensen pointed out Series "E" bonds are sold at 75 per cent of maturity value 10 years from issue date, value 10 per cent interest if held to maturity and sold in \$25 to \$1,000 denominations.

\$25 per cent treasury bonds of 1950-1955 are in denominations from \$500 to \$10,000. They are dated February 1, 1944, are due March 15, 1950, and are callable May 15, 1955. They are issued in coupon or registered form at buyer's option.

Series "F" bonds sell for 74 per cent of maturity value and run for 12 years from issue date. Interest is at 2.53 per cent if held to maturity and denominations are \$25 to \$10,000. Series "G" bonds sell at 100 per cent of face value and are redeemable at interest and are redeemable 12 years from issue date. Denominations are \$100 to \$10,000.
