civic improvements locally following the end of the war.

Local industries should be adapted to the community in the opinion of J. L. Searcy, chairman of the industrial and commercial committee. He pointed to the cannery, the condenser, the nut shell plant and others that tie in directly with agricultural production. Searcy said a nut drier was definitely in prospect and that could be promoted in connection with dairy farming here. This county, he said, is now the largest nut producing county in the state.

Jake Weil, retail trades chairman, urged co-operation in the endorsement plan to prevent wasteful practices and for the protection of local business firms.

Members were urged by President Thomas H. Bailey to make suggestions for the work of the organization and possible criticisms to him or members of the board of directors.
