

Red Cross Garments Displayed at Meet

Different garments made at the Red Cross production rooms were displayed at the meeting of the county chapter Thursday night at headquarters. Mrs. E. D. Carver, chairman of the sewing department, was unable to be present, and Mrs. Robert Cull, chairman of the knitting department, explained the exhibit, which included a sample of all garments sent out in the last shipment (a report of which was in last week's Argus). The production department recently received the following letter from a serviceman at Geiger Field, Spokane, Wash.:
