Mrs. Bruce Hahn of this city received a letter from her husband, who is serving in the U. S. armed forces somewhere in England, in which he said that although most bells had been silent for a long time, Christmas bells rang out again this year. A clipping from a London paper says in part: "Britons throughout the world celebrated Christmas in the spirit that though this was the first Christmas of the war it might be the last. In London the bells echoed over the ruins of famous churches destroyed during the raids. Bow bells were silent as were those of St. Clement Dane—the church of oranges and lemons," both ruined in the blitz. But the bells of Westminster Abbey, St. Paul's Cathedral, and St. Martin-in-the-Fields were among those rung.—Allied forces attended services in great numbers. United States officers and men being especially numerous."
