Two soldier hitchhikers held up and robbed Mr. and Mrs. Albert J. Bailey Jr. of Forest Grove Saturday night near Beaverton, according to a report to state police.

Northwest Foundry Workers Strike Imperiling Vital War Production

Seventy-nine war-vital Oregon and Washington foundries became idle Tuesday as the result of a strike of molders and foundry workers. They remained idle despite high-ranking and widespread appeals whereby production of Flying Fortress planes will not be immediately threatened.

Nathan P. Feinsinger, War Labor board disputes director, said the work stoppage is seriously interrupting production of critical war materials.

Off the job in the two states were more than 6000 men, about 4500 of them striking molders and the others machinists, blacksmiths and boiler-makers who refused to cross picket lines. The molders and foundry workers per cent in protest against the regional WLB's rejection of a demand for an 8-cent-hourly increase in the \$120 hourly foundry rate.

The bloodiest battle of the war was reported raging deep in Germany's defense belt west of Leningrad Wednesday after Soviet tanks smashed through the Nazi line in the wake of an artillery barrage so devastating that it left enemy troops literally speechless.

War Budget Asked Congress received from President Roosevelt Thursday a \$50,700,000 budget for the 1945 fiscal year—perhaps the last huge wartime budget and notably chiefly for a contemplated downturn in war spending and upturn in postwar costs.

Churchill Returns Prime Minister Churchill returned to London Tuesday, completely recovered from his attack of pneumonia, and was given a rousing reception by the house of commons.

Rome Bombed British and American bombers bombed outskirts of Rome Thursday.

Early Use Meat Points Permitted Plan to permit advance use of 120 red meat points to stimulate on-the-farm purchase of pork and other rationed meats was announced Monday by the office of price administration. The program does not increase the individual meat ration allowed for any consumer, but it makes it possible to buy fairly large amounts of meat from farm slaughters, it was explained.

Red stamps in book four numbered "eight" and lettered "A" were validated for immediate use in on-farm purchases. The last 96 brown points remaining in book three may also be used for advance purchases of pork, giving every consumer 210 meat points to purchase pork from the farmer.

The number eight coupons in book four are each good for 10 points regardless of the point values printed on them. These coupons would have normally been exchanged for the new ration tokens after February 22.

Advance use of points was expected to encourage farmers to slaughter on their farms and cut down the number of hogs coming to market. There has been criticism from farm sources of the rationing system, with hogs piling up at terminal markets and several stockyards forced to declare an embargo on shipments of live hogs.

Lt. Hundis Assigned To Mitchell Field Word has been received that Lt. Alfred W. Hundis, accompanied by his wife, the former Wilma Schildhauer, has arrived at Mitchell Field, New York City, where for the present he has been assigned as a special officer.

Lt. Hundis was commissioned a lieutenant in the air corps at Miami Beach, Fla., January 8, winning top honors in his class of 24 squadrons. He is well known in this locality as he is a graduate of Pacific university and prior to induction into the air corps was athletic coach at Sherwood high school.
