co-owners in series E bonds to the amount of \$10,000 maturity value issued during any one calendar year and that their co-owners may buy bonds in the names of any of all of their children with either parent as co-owner to the amount of \$5,000 maturity value for each child during any one calendar year.

Co-operating with the Fourth War Loan drive banks of Washington county will loan up to 80 per cent of the cost for the purchase of negotiable bonds. Christensen announced rate of interest will be the same as the bonds drive.

Kickoff meetings for volunteer workers were held last Tuesday, Friday and Monday to instruct solicitors regarding the campaign and details of the campaign which will continue until February 15. It was pointed out that all bonds sold in the county since January 1 of this year will count toward the Fourth War Loan quota.

Quotas set up for each of the six county areas are as follows: Hillsboro, \$644,000; Forest Grove, \$453,000; Banks, \$93,000; Beaverton, \$241,000; Tigard, \$191,500; and Sherwood, \$113,000.
