**Saving of Paper And Tin Cans Urged**

cannot be used. Each of these types of paper should be segregated, tied securely in bundles not over 14 inches high and stored in homes pending a collection announcement.

Announcement of a tin can collection, probably through the schools of the county, may be expected shortly, according to Ide. Residents of the county are asked to prepare their cans by cutting out the ends, putting the ends inside the cans and flattening them. They should then be stored in a dry place until collected. If properly prepared, salvaged cans will not take up very much space, it was explained.

The main problem in salvage campaign is transportation. Transportation, manpower and market, Finney declared. A sufficient amount of salvage must be in prospect to make a campaign and transportation justified. Market for the materials is assured before a collection is announced, he said.

Need of salvaging cardboard boxes was emphasized by Finney. Tons of this material is now being burned or thrown away by stores, and every bit of it should and must be saved, said Finney. Boxes should be flattened and tied in bundles about 12 inches high.

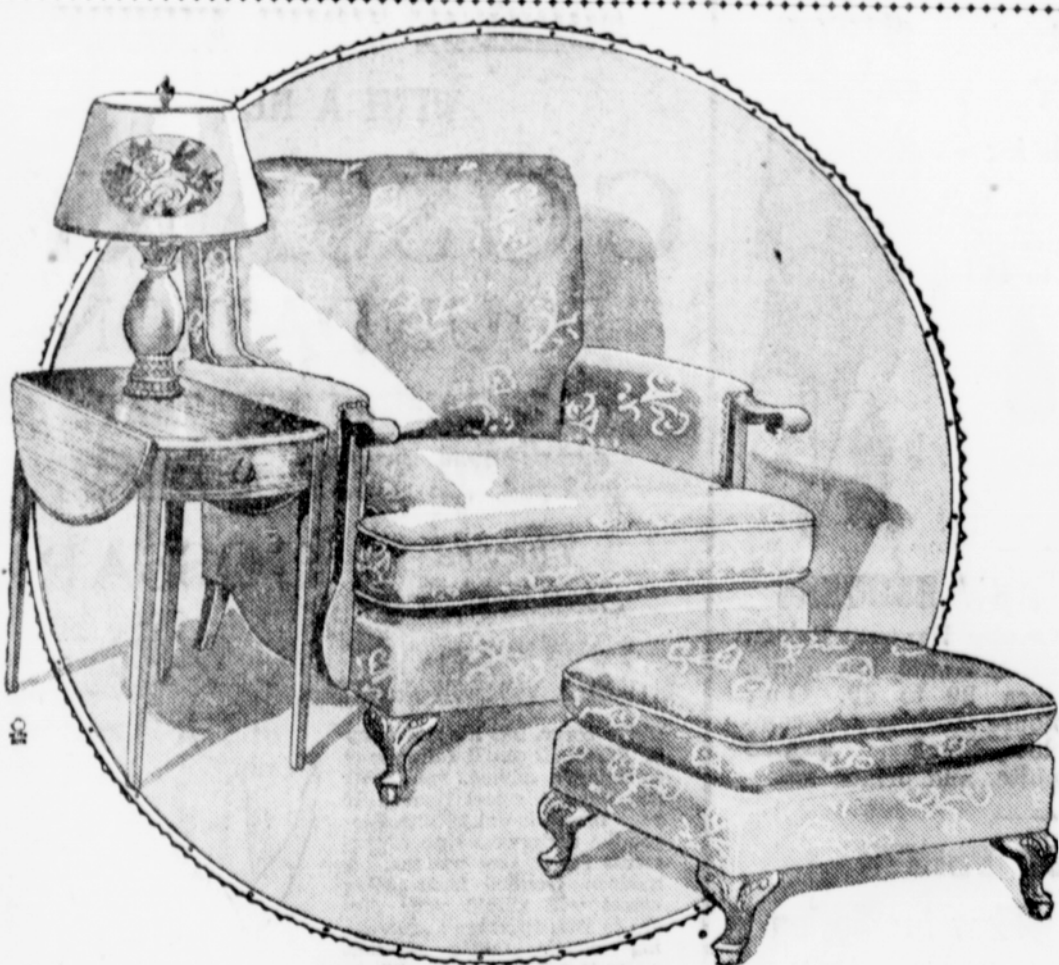
