Juvenile Delinquency Panel Feature Of Aloha-Huber Parent-Teacher Meet

ALOHA-HUBER—A panel discussion on juvenile delinquency featured the Aloha-Huber P-T-A meeting January 18. Participating were J. W. Poynter, superintendent of elementary schools in Hillsboro; Graydon Loree, pastor of the Aloha Baptist church; Richard Busch, deputy sheriff of Washington county; Harold Meyer, county juvenile officer; Mrs. Fenning and Mr. Gordon.

Meyer asserted that this problem we usually call child delinquency is really parent delinquency and should be attacked with that in mind. He pointed to the rise in the number of juveniles before the courts in the last several years and brought out that the greatest increase in charges against juveniles involved larceny for boys and moral charges for girls. Of the 513

boys and girls contacted by the juvenile authorities of this county in the last year, 68 were brought before the county judge and of these, 18 were sent to the training school.

Need for consistency on the part of the parents in dealing with their children and the importance of being companionable with them was stressed by Meyer. He also cited the inadequacy of present laws governing juveniles.

Poynter brought out as important factors the overcrowded conditions in the schools in the individual grades. He urged closer contact between the parents and school and provision of outside interests for children as a busy child cannot be a delinquent child.

Rev. Loree, discussing the situation from the angle of the church, pointed out how children started dropping out of Sunday school at 11 or 12 years of age, a time when they particularly need the training and help the church can give. He then commended the need for other than commercial entertainment for boys and girls.

Deputy Busch explained how the sheriff's office is interested in the detection and apprehension of delinquents. He called attention to the need for improving laws concerning juveniles.

Mrs. Fenning, speaking from the mother's angle, urged regular school visits, engaging in P-T-A activities and in other organized society such as boy and girl scouts.

Mr. Gordon, speaking from the standpoint of a father, urged greater religious training and greater discipline.

People were reminded of the annual school meeting in the spring. Anyone over 21, who has resided in the district over 30 days, may vote.

It was decided to sponsor a group of Girl Scouts. Several groups have been started, but more are desired and anyone willing to lead or help in any way with the girls is urged to contact Mrs. Fenning or Mrs. Englerth as adult help is badly needed.

Mrs. Loree, school cook, proposed that the help the government for schools serving complete lunchneers be accepted. This received favorable action and from now on a complete lunchneer, except dessert, will be served to the children at a cost of 10 cents with milk two cents extra. The government will contribute up to six cents toward the cost of the food supplies for each individual lunchneer served. A regular helper for Mrs. Loree has been hired. So far the lunchneer budget is holding up very well.

Date for the box social will be announced at the next meeting. It was postponed because of so much flu in the community.

Next county council meeting was announced for February 8 at Forest Grove.

The next regular Aloha-Huber P-T-A meeting will be the annual Day meeting February 13. The fourth grade will give a little entertainment.

Also that avoiding exposure and keeping a child nutritionally fit is the best means of prevention.

Lucille House was absent several days from Bloomington school because of illness.

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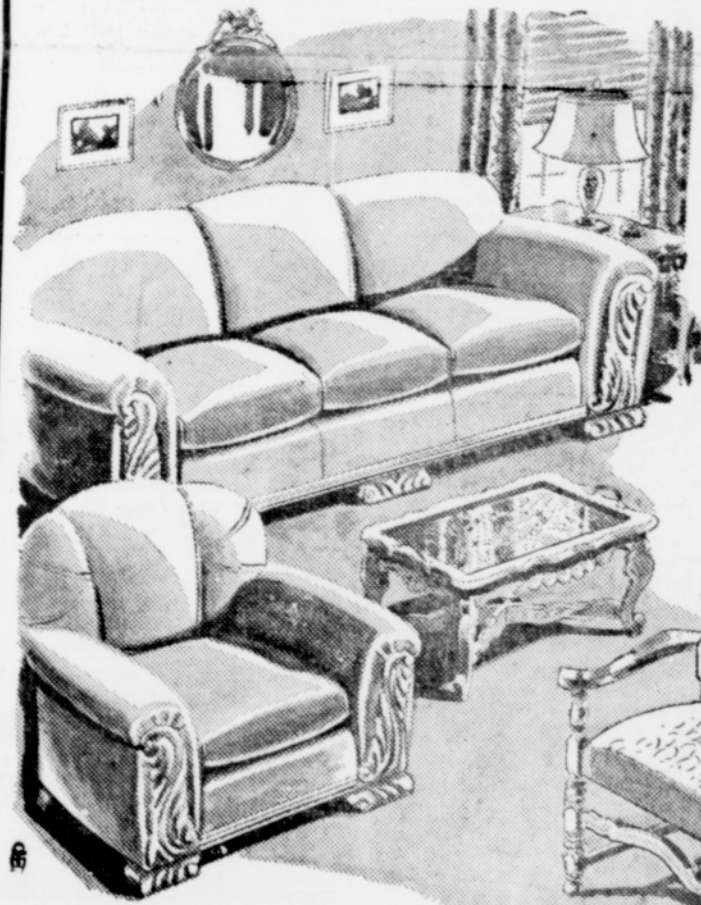
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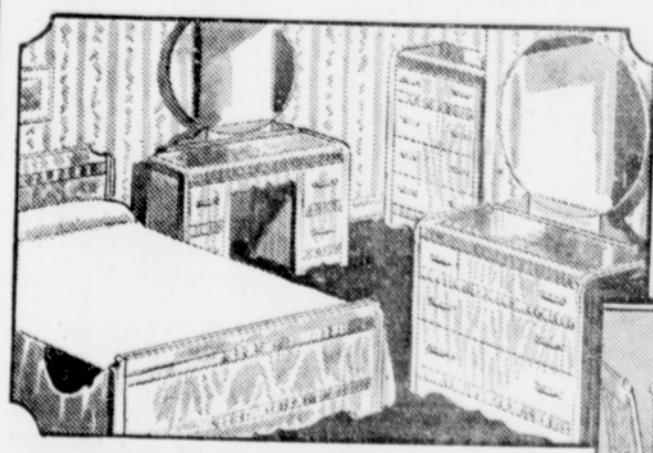
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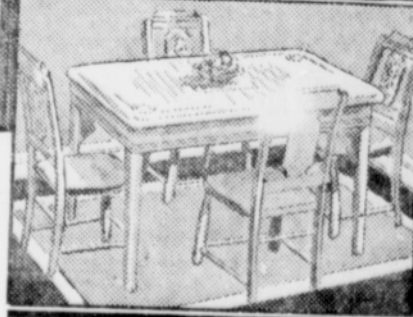
