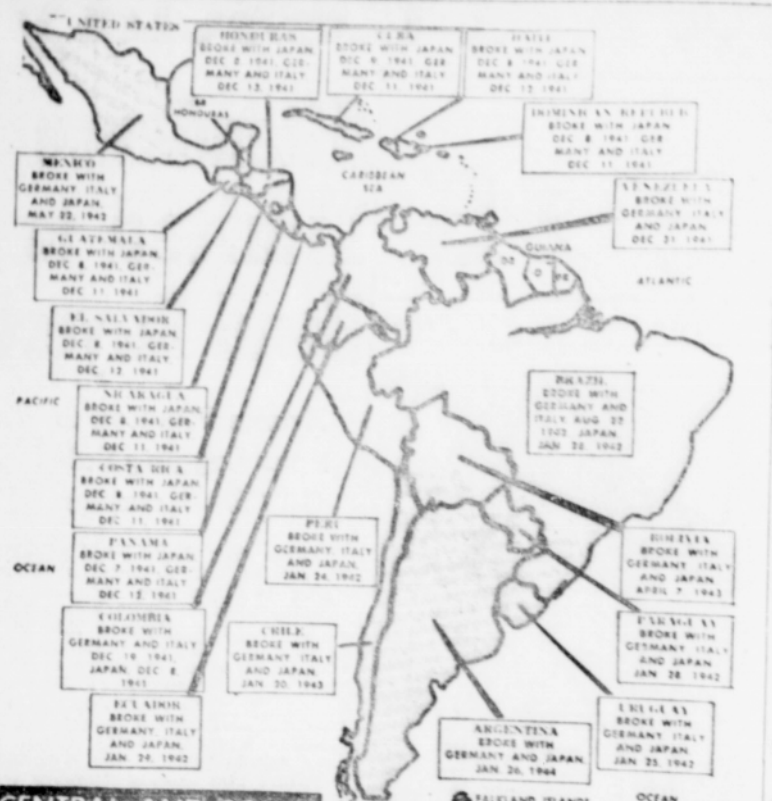




Polio Campaign For Cornelius Meets Success

CORNELIUS—The infantile paralysis drive has been completed for Cornelius and the chairman, Mrs. Donald Engelen reports they have a total of \$12,512. The Cornelius school collected \$38.76, a fine record for the school. Mrs. Engelen wishes to thank everyone who helped make this drive a success. Fifty per cent of every dollar that has been raised in this community will remain in Washington county to help care for more than 50 polio sufferers in this area. The balance is turned over to the national foundation for infantile paralysis to carry on laboratory research to find the cause and cure and prevention of the dread disease and to help any community with a greater epidemic than it can finance.

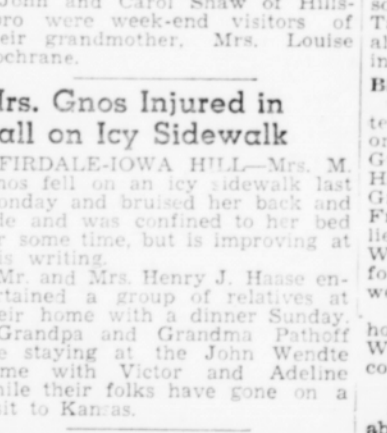

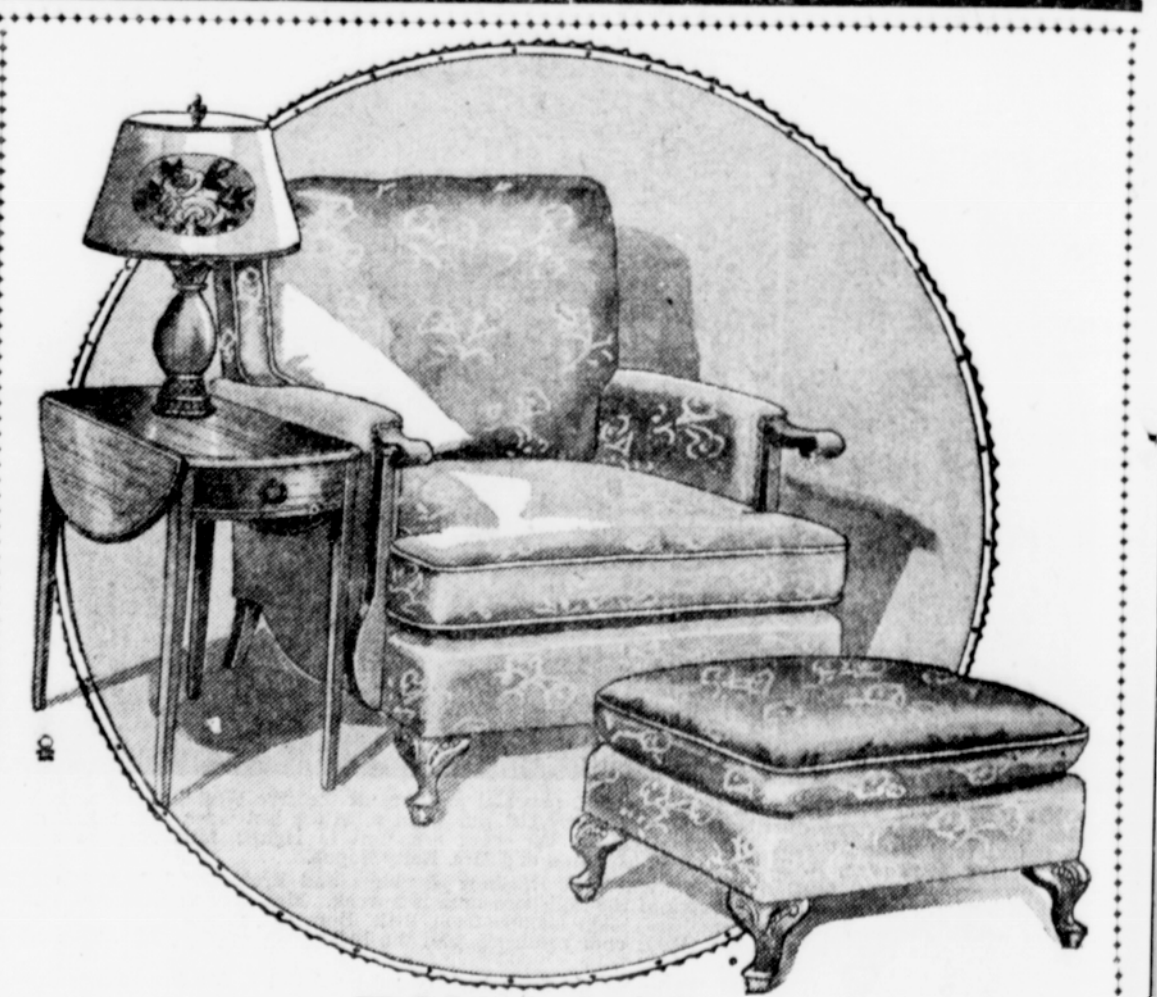
