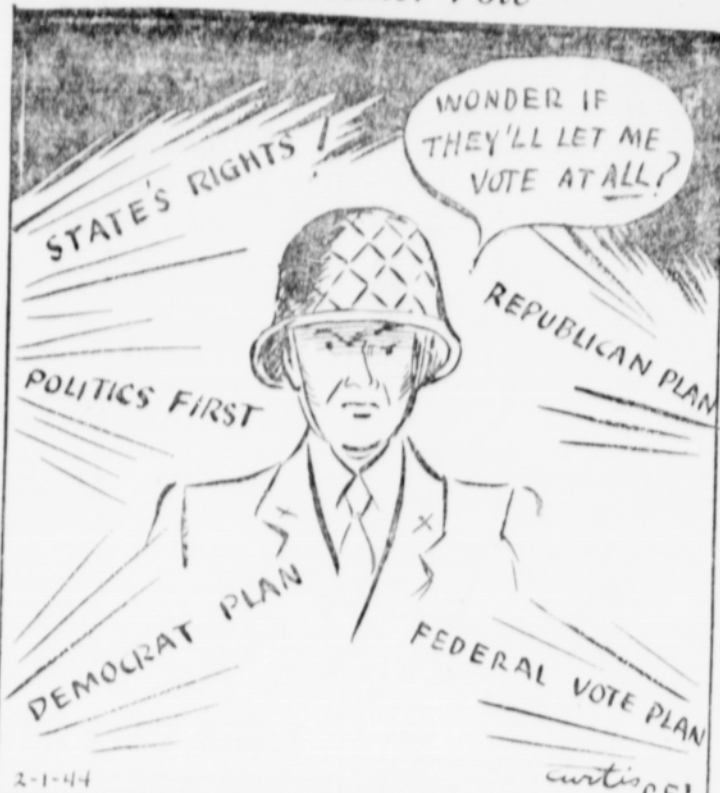




Plan Improvements To Water System

In case the improvement as herein indicated, cannot be made this year, the money will be held in reserve for future work.

Net Earnings Given

The report shows net earnings of \$34,751.61 after interest and taxes of \$4,450.83 have been paid. Total revenues amounting to \$39,202.44 includes residential and domestic sales of \$30,337.74, commercial and industrial sales \$22,161.44, irrigation sales \$66.01, private fire protection \$204, public fire protection \$816, other sales to public authorities \$1,073.44, sales to other water utilities \$7,304.30 and miscellaneous sales \$390.77.

Operation expenses of \$15,608.74 were divided as follows: Source of supply \$3,303.66, pumping \$2,463.79, purification \$2,409.62, transmission and distribution \$1,633.70, commercial office \$3,127.64, and administrative and general \$2,610.03. Maintenance expense of \$7,502.50 included source of supply \$2,336.42, pumping \$2,068.58, purification \$355.59 and transmission and distribution \$6,439.91. Total operation expense was \$23,111.24.

Additions and betterments in 1943 totaling \$4,332.59 included

source of supply \$144, pumping \$249.36, transmission \$36.50, distribution \$2,625.83, transportation \$21, office \$150.65 and tools and equipment \$405.25.

Total installed gallons delivered was 342,653,000. There are 1925 services, 1801 meters, 68 hydrants and 47.68 miles of mains.

In submitting their report to the council, the commissioners, M. H. Stevenson, chairman, F. V. Engdinger and J. M. Person, said "We wish to take this opportunity to express to the mayor and council and to the citizens of Hillsboro our appreciation for the continued support and co-operation in the operation of the water system of the city."

A resolution to assess delinquent sewer assessments against the property was passed by the city council Tuesday night. Hearing of ob- jections will be held at the next regular council meeting at 8 p. m. Tuesday, March 7. More than \$400 in sewer rentals are now delinquent.

City Attorney Paul Patterson and City Manager J. W. Barney were authorized to take such steps as may be necessary to secure the city's share of road taxes levied within the city.

Patterson was authorized to draw an ordinance for a zone change at 10th and Maple streets, there being no objections made at the time of the hearing.

A report of the police made by Manager Barney revealed operating costs at \$5,694.32 with fines and forfeitures bringing in \$2,320.50. A total of 723 arrests was made during 1943 of which 722 were found guilty. Of these 553 were for parking tickets, violation of road and driving laws 112, disorderly conduct 12 and drunkenness 25. There were 9 arrests for larceny and 4 for auto theft, the cases being turned over to the county authorities.

Bond Successes Vital to Morale Of Fighting Men

Successful war bond drives at home are great morale-builders for the men on the fighting fronts of the world. This is the keynote of the many letters received from Oregon men in overseas service by the state war finance committee.

Three of these letters which are featured in a Fourth War Loan campaign booklet were by Washington county service men, Lt. J. P. Weber and Pvt. Donald Alexander of Hillsboro, and Capt. Garlyn Munkres of Forest Grove.

"As an Oregonian, it is a source of immense pride to be a resident of a state that has made such an enviable record in the purchase of war bonds. I am not fortunate enough to have any Oregon boys in my outfit, but I meet many of them, and they all have my appreciation of the way the folks back home are backing us up. We all want to return home to Oregon, but we don't want to work until the job is done and you can be assured that Hitler's downfall will not end the war out here in the Pacific. The folks back home can hasten our return by their continued purchases of war bonds. If you could only see the equipment that must be shipped over here before any operation can take place, and all the soldiers that equipment represents, you could more readily appreciate the need through war bond purchases."

"Please urge the people in Oregon to give the men in the army the equipment and they will do the job—they're doing it every day."

Private Alexander's letter reads: "It's been a long time since I last saw Oregon," and in this theatre one finds few from these parts when we do chance to meet we have much to talk about, the state in general and its people in particular. We sure have some memories which are especially treasured at this season of the year. We speak of the last Christmas we had two or three years ago and of the hunting season we'll have to miss again this year. Of course in a way it's hunting season here but this time we're hunting as well. Folks, don't forget to back us up with those war bond dollars. Not only are you giving us our future but you are giving us courage and adding to the material to complete our job. Buy those extra bonds now to help bring us back. In so doing you'll be wishing us a "Bond" voyage home."

Captain Munkres' letter reads: "The men along side of whom I fight are pledged 'for the duration.' We often pray that the war may last that long. Please tell the people of Oregon that the 'all-out' purchase of war bonds will shorten that 'duration.'"

Dog License Fees Payable by March 1

License fees for all licensable dogs over the age of eight months and for dogs owned or kept within the state over 30 days are now due and payable at the office of County Clerk W. A. Tupper. After March 1 the fee will be increased \$1 for failure to procure a license.

Fees set for 1944 are \$1 for a male dog, \$1.50 for a female and \$1 for a spayed female. Licenses may be ordered by mail, stating the name and address of the person to whom the license is to be issued and the sex of the dog.

After March 1 the fee is \$1 more for failure to procure licenses for licensable dogs becoming over eight months of age after that date or for dogs over eight months old owned or kept within the state over 30 days after March 1.

Tupper requested that dog owners secure their licenses promptly and not put it off until the deadline.
