CORNELIUS—Herman F. Seidler, 81, died at his home in Cornelius Monday night after an extended illness.

He was born in Germany December 19, 1859, and as a small boy came with his parents to locate at Racine, Wis. After living here for a few years he went to Elwood, Kan., and in 1873 moved to Pendleton, taking two months to make the trip. Two years later he moved to Portland and was employed in a meat market there, and later worked on a section crew for 18 years in this vicinity.

From here he went to McMinville where he owned and operated a dairy farm for 30 years. Seven years ago he sold the farm and moved back to Cornelius, where he had since resided.

Surviving him are his widow, Minnie Seidler, Cornelius, a daughter, Mrs. Minnie Chown, one son, Lester Seidler, and two grandchildren, all of Portland. He is survived also by two granddaughters, Mrs. Antonia Blake of Portland and Mrs. Louise Hoskins of Hillsboro, and a brother, Rudolph Seidler, of Portland.

Funeral services will be held from the Cornelius Lutheran church, of which he was a member, at 1:30 p. m. Friday, February 11, with Rev. W. R. Kraxberger officiating. Burial will be in the cemetery.

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County Hoop Tourney Here On Feb. 25-26

Basketball championship of Washington county will be at stake in a "sudden death" tournament scheduled for February 25 and 26 at the Hilhi Hoopsters' arena, according to an announcement Tuesday by John R. Cox, high school principal. The tourney will be a preliminary to the play-off for district representative in the annual state basketball tournament.

Teams to compete in the local series will be the Hillsboro Spartans, the Forest Grove Vikings, the Beaverton Beavers and the Tigard Tigers. One defeat in the tournament will mean elimination, Cox explained.

Winners of the local tournament will meet the Yamhill county champions. The winners will then meet the winner of the Clackamas county and Multnomah county outside of Portland tourney for the right to enter the state meet.

Cancellation of the Hillsboro-Beaverton and Forest Grove-Tigard TVV tilts for February 25 has been announced to make way for the county tournament. If any of the competing teams has a chance at the league title, the game played in the tournament here will count as an official TVV game, Cox declared.
