

County P.T.A. Council Observes Founding

The Washington County Council of Parent-Teachers met Tuesday, February 8, in the Central school, Forest Grove, to observe the founding of the Parent-Teacher movement.

In the morning the reports of the local Parent-Teacher representatives were received as were the reports of the chairmen of the various county council committees. There were 13 associations represented in the group of 50 persons present. Gaston, Manning and Metzger, newly organized Parent-Teacher associations, were represented as was Timber for the first time this year. Some of the pupils of Central school gave a program.

Mrs. Garfield Hite, Sherwood, a past president of Washington County Council, gave a brief talk on "The Aims of the Parent-Teacher Movement." Just before she concluded she gave some of the highlights of when the council was first organized in Forest Grove November 15, 1924.

After lunch Dr. McCollum, dean of music, Pacific university, illustrated by the use of records the development of music from the earliest form in round singing to some of the modern writers' descriptive music.

Mrs. E. Ray Miller of Hillsboro presented Rev. Harold Shellhart of the Sellwood Methodist church, Rev. Shellhart had attended a youth conference held in Kansas City and he spoke of some of the things that have been done successfully in some cities to combat the delinquency problem. He gave the following definition of delinquency by Martha McDowell, children's bureau, Washington, D. C.: "Delinquency is a deficiency disease—it comes from lack of spiritual nourishment." Interested adults working with young people who feel the sense of responsibility of this problem was one of the solutions. A questionnaire circulated through a school brought forth just what time of day and form of recreation this group was most interested in. To solve this a meeting of different youth groups will be held and study made of these questionnaires to see how best their present facilities could be changed to fit the activities of the youth of the particular community asked for.

The meeting adjourned to meet April 11 in Beaverton with Coon.
