

D. M. McInnis Dies Monday; Funeral Today

CHEHALEM MOUNTAIN—Duncan M. McInnis, 86, died Monday evening at his home here after being in poor health for several months. Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. today (Thursday) at Mt. Olive church at Laurel.

Mr. McInnis was born in Nova Scotia June 27, 1857, and came to Boston, Mass., when a young man. He lived for a time at Marysville, Pa., before coming to Portland in 1883, where he worked as a carpenter with his brother, Alex McInnis, and helped build the Portland hotel. Later he moved to Farmington, where he engaged in farming.

Laura McCormick and Duncan McInnis were married February 8, 1886, at the home of her sister, Mrs. Fanny Robinson, at Farmington. In 1889 they moved to Portland, where he again engaged in the construction business for a short time until he entered the police service. He was a member of the Caledonia club and set an undefeated record of a high kick of nine feet and six inches. He was beaten only by his twin brother, Hector McInnis, in the caber and the hammer throw.

Mr. and Mrs. McInnis operated a boarding house at Fort Flagler, Wash., for the construction crew that built the fort. After about six years they returned to their farm at Jacktown, which they later sold and moved to Hazeldele, where he built and operated a store. This store burned in about five years and the family moved to West Stayton, then a new boom town. Again he built and ran a general merchandise store for several years before they returned to the Tualatin valley.

In 1920 Mr. and Mrs. McInnis took up the last homestead on Chehalis mountain, which they later sold. They made their home there for the last 18 years on the Chehalis mountain farm formerly the home of Mrs. McInnis' parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. W. H. McCormick.

Mr. and Mrs. McInnis celebrated their 58th wedding anniversary last Tuesday. He is survived by the widow, two sons, Don of Redville and Kenneth at home; two daughters, Mrs. Alice Painter and Mrs. Dolly Shook, both of Chehalis mountain; 17 grandchildren and four great-grandchildren. Two daughters, Mrs. Jessie Martin and Mrs. Cassie York, preceded him in death.

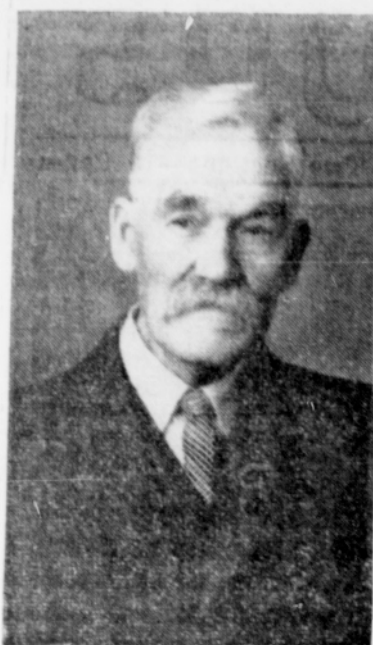
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Don Tykeson Selected Best Public Speaker

Newberg Man in Congress Race

Dan Harmon, Newberg automobile dealer, farmer and civic leader, has filed his candidacy for the republican nomination for congress from the first district in opposition to Congressman James R. Mott.

Harmon expresses the opinion that the nation needs more level headed business men and not so many politicians in the postwar congress. He contends that the house of representatives must have the practical influence of farmers, men from the ranks of labor, men from the armed forces, manufacturers, business men and some lawyers.

He divides the trying problems of the postwar congress into four important phases: first, post war reconstruction; second, veterans' legislation; third, the problem of the colossal war debt, and fourth the delicate problem of foreign relations.

Mr. Harmon is 43 years of age; was born in Mississippi, the son of a farmer-school teacher. He was educated at Mississippi A&M college and served in the army of occupation in Germany. He is a member of the Elks lodge, a Republican and now a past president of the Newberg chamber of commerce. He is an automobile dealer and also farms a large tract of acreage in the Dundee hills.

Mr. Harmon will address the voters of this district over KOIN at 6:15 p. m., Saturday, February 19.

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McCluey Training Pilots in Texas

FLYING TRAINING DETACHMENT, Fort Stockton, Texas—LeRoy J. McCluey, son of Mrs. Ruby Graham of Hillsboro route 4, is utilizing his experience as a civilian flyer to assist the army air forces training program as a civilian pilot instructor at the Fort Stockton primary school.

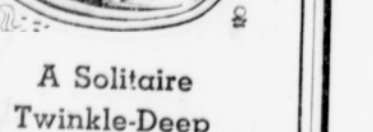

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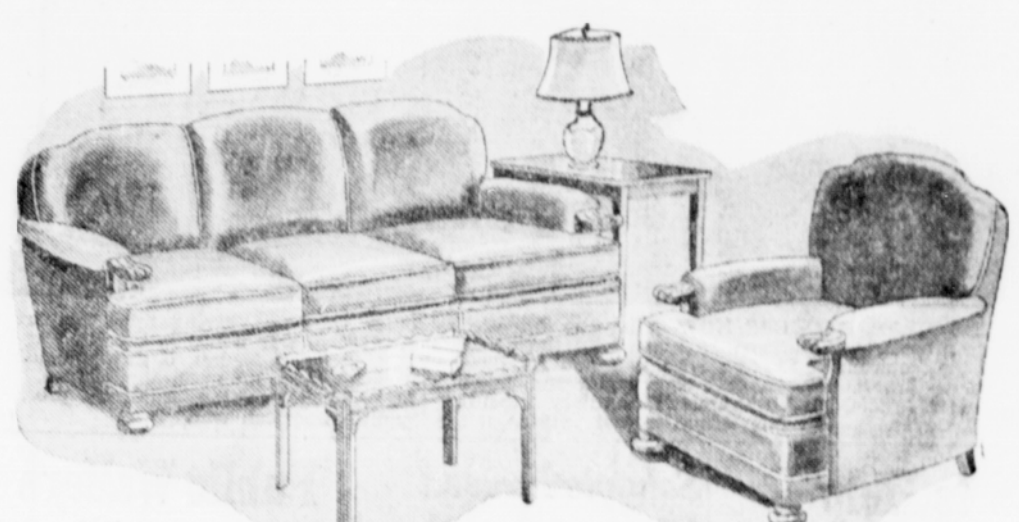

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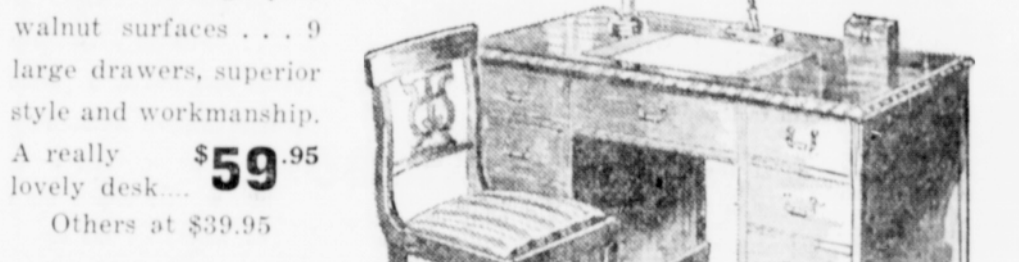
