

F.D.R.-Congress Breach Widens With Tax Veto

President Roosevelt's veto of the new tax bill coupled with a stinging message Tuesday widened the breach between the White House and congress. Democratic chairman of tax-writing committees promptly backed its enactment over his disapproval. Senator Alben W. Barkley of Kentucky, who became Democratic leader of the senate in 1937 with the aid of President Roosevelt, in a dramatic speech on the floor of the senate Wednesday split with the president over his veto of the \$2 billion-plus tax bill and at the same time submitted his resignation.

Air Blitz Seen
Prime Minister Winston Churchill promised the greatest air blitz ever seen in Germany in spring and summer, but soberly withheld encouragement that the European war would end in 1944. In his war review before the house of commons, the prime minister spoke with studied caution of the power the German army still wields and derided the view that Hitler is about to collapse.

Shakeup Jap Command
Most drastic shakeup of the war in the Japanese high command, involving the shuffling of the chiefs of staff of both the army and navy and general staffs, was announced by Tokyo Monday following official Japanese admissions of heavy losses in last week's great American attack on Truk. Premier Tojo taken over as chief of army staff.

United States Pacific fleet has

sunk 19 Japanese ships, destroyed 201 enemy planes and wrought other heavy damage at the Nipponese island bastion of Truk in "partial settlement" for Pearl Harbor. Only one American ship was damaged and 17 planes lost. The initial approach of the U. S. fleet was not detected and "there was no enemy air opposition on the second day of the attack."

Krivoi Rog Taken
Moscow celebrated the capture of Krivoi Rog, the Ukraine town of iron mines on the 20th anniversary of the red army Wednesday. Premier Marshal Joseph Stalin triumphantly announced that in one year the Russians had swept the Germans from almost three-quarters of occupied Russia in a westward advance that in places exceeded 100 miles.

Enitowek Captured
U. S. troops have captured entire Enitowek island after stubborn opposition and naval and air forces are attacking Parry island in the Pacific fleet headquarters at Pearl Harbor Monday. American casualties in the capture of Enitowek atoll were only approximately 150 dead and 350 wounded.

Riddle Jap Convoy
Allied fliers catch their second Japanese convoy in a week off the Bismark archipelago and sink six medium merchantmen, one corvette, two gunboats and probably destroyed three freighters last Saturday and Sunday. General MacArthur announces.

Air Factories Pounded
A gigantic allied force of 2000 planes, in the greatest single aerial assault of the war, attacked Hitler's fighter plane plants deep in Germany Sunday, crippling Nazi opposition to the coming invasion. German fighter plane factories at Leipzig, Gotha, Bernburg, Ascher-
