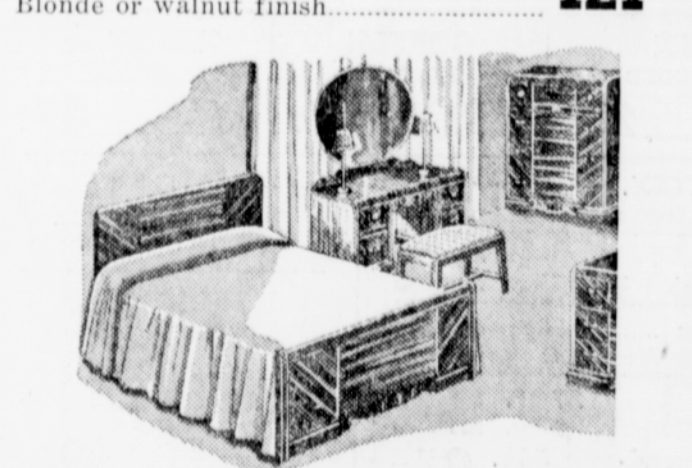

Booklet Cites Workmen Rights

State industrial accident commission has recently issued a handbook for workmen which defines the legal rights of an injured workman and explains the simple steps necessary to conform with the legal requirements which entitle him to medical care and payments for time lost through an injury.

A schedule of amounts allowed for time losses is given which is determined by the earnings of the workman at the time of the accident, his marital status and number of dependent children.

Temporary total disability, permanent total disability and permanent partial disability benefits are enumerated and awards for fatalities are listed.

A resume of the general provisions of the workman's compensation law is given in addition to information relative to occupational diseases as covered by the 1943 legislative enactments. Methods for filing an application for "rehearing" are explained and information given relative to the procedure to be followed when a third party is involved in an accident which causes an injury to a workman of an employer covered by the workman's compensation act.

Copies of the booklet may be secured without charge by employees, employers, organizations and others upon application to offices of the commission at Salem, Portland or Eugene.

Chaplain Relates Incident at Altu

One day after Chaplain (First Lieutenant) Clarence J. Merriman, who had been in Japan, had been recently taken by United States forces on Altu, the Americans began to search among the ruins for souvenirs.

"There was a big fat boy, about 19, near me, who also was searching the rubbish," the chaplain said. "Suddenly enemy machine-gun fire began cutting the tent to pieces. Of course, we hit the floor against the fortifications until the fire ceased. No one was hurt but this boy beside me, and he was yelling and plowing under the debris like a mole."

"When we had worked our way out of the tent to the safety of a nearby knoll, this boy discovered I was a chaplain and showed me where one of the bullets had gone through his coat and trousers, ripping his woollen in places, and burning a streak across his back. 'Then he looked at me very seriously and said, 'Chaplain, I was nearer to hell than I have ever

President Urges Support of Red Cross War Fund

Proclamation designating March as Red Cross month was issued Saturday by President Franklin D. Roosevelt. He set forth the war time activities of the organization and urged support of its fund-raising campaign which opens next Wednesday.

Complete text of the president's proclamation follows:

WHEREAS the war has entered a decisive stage requiring the fullest measure of individual sacrifice;

WHEREAS the American National Red Cross is an auxiliary to the United States armed forces and, as such, is providing indispensable service to our troops throughout the world as well as to their families at the home front;

WHEREAS these war-time activities, including the collection of life-saving blood for the wounded, recreation work in military hospitals, provision of aid to families of servicemen, shipment of food parcels to prisoners of war, production of surgical dressings, operation of overseas clubs and recreation centers, and recruitment of army and navy nurses, all combine to save countless lives, restore hope, and provide comfort for our fighting men;

WHEREAS, through its vast network of local chapters, this agency of our people simultaneously conducts an extensive program of train and community service, while continuing with traditional efficiency to lessen the distress of those overwhelmed by disaster; and

WHEREAS this agency is wholly dependent upon individual support and personal participation and is issuing its 1944 appeal to the entire citizenry to contribute to the Fund of \$200,000,000;

Governor Snell Urges Support Red Cross Drive

Governor Earl Snell reminds the public that one of the most desperately popular drives for money, the raising of funds for the American Red Cross, will be held from March 1 to March 31.

"This year the quota set for Oregon is \$1,750,000, which is about three times greater than the quota last year, just as the national quota has been expanded to \$200,000,000. The increase is accounted for by the necessity of providing Red Cross facilities wherever there are American troops overseas," said Governor Snell. "Of the funds contributed 87 per cent will be devoted to overseas work, or to illustrate: Of the \$1,750,000 assigned to Oregon, \$1,525,000 will be used for work in Europe, the Pacific theater and other places where boys from Oregon are fighting for a better world."

"The American Red Cross is the one civilian organization through which people with sons or daughters in uniform can contact their relatives. The contacts and service thus maintained by the Red Cross afford the troops recreation; agents of the Red Cross visit the military hospitals taking messages of the boys up to the front back home. The American Red Cross in short performs those tasks which parents would like to do in person. The American Red Cross is your agent."

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"The Red Cross must not fail in 1944," Chairman Gates declared. "It's up to you... the people... the mothers and fathers of sons in service... the wives they left behind... the men and women who produce the materiel of war... the thousands of Americans who are at the boy to have all the comforts the Red Cross can bring."

The CIO has already pledged approximately \$1,850 to the drive in recognition, according to Chairman Gates, of the Red Cross' long and devoted commitment as yet, the chairman declared, but it freely supported the drive. It will fall to the Red Cross to make the same for the Red Cross campaign.

"We know we will have the whole-hearted support of all of our loyal citizens," Chairman Gates continued. "The only thing that can mar our drive will be their failure to realize that, as the war progresses, there will be much heavier demands upon the Red Cross. Therefore, we must be more liberal in our contributions than in the past."

"It is now up to our citizens to not only campaign and county over the top as they have always done."

Area 2—F. L. Brown, chairman, \$2,000. Districts included: Blomington, Buck Haven, Grabel, Gravel, Granger, Hazledale, Iowa Hill, Jackson, Johnson, Kinton, Laurel, Midway, Laurewood, Mount, Pleasant View, Reedville, Rosedale, Witch Head.

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Area 4—Mrs. J. R. Talbert, chairman, \$2,000. Districts included: Beaver, Bony, Bony, Cedar Mill, Garden Home, Hiteon, McKay, Progress, Whitford, St. Mary's, Girls' School.

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Area 7—Mr. A. H. Busch, chairman, \$2,000. Districts included: Academy, Arcade, (Pumpkin Ridge), Buck Mountain, (Dixie Mountain), Corvallis, Cornwell, Eddy, Glencoe, Harney, Hewwood, Hillsboro, Jackson, Kilgore, Lelyville, Lincoln, Menchum, Mount, Mier, North Plains, Pleasant View, Schefflin, Sewell, Shady Brook, Vadis, Varley, Walace.

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Generally speaking it is necessary for a voter to re-register if he has moved from the precinct in which he formerly resided, failed to vote in either the primary or general election in 1942 or changed his or her name.
