Observance of Oregon Safety Week Is Urged

Mayor Hugh S. Rogers has joined Governor Earl Svett, Secretary of State Bob Farrell and other safety-minded officials in urging widespread observance of Oregon Safety Week, March 19-25.

"That week has been designated as Safety Week for the purpose of focusing public attention on the importance of preventing accidents as a wartime conservation measure," Mayor Rogers said.

"I earnestly urge local citizens to participate in this week by informing themselves on the importance of accident prevention and by resolving to accept personal responsibility for the avoidance of accidents in the home, in traffic on the job and in recreation," Mayor Rogers said.

"Time lost by Oregonians during the year 1943 was sufficient to build an additional 83 Liberty ships in this state. That is some indication of the cost accidents impose on the state's effort to win these costly accidents through the exercise of care, common sense and consideration for the rights of others."

Co-operating in sponsoring the observance are the Oregon Safety association, the safety division of the secretary of state's office, the Portland Traffic Safety commission, the American Red Cross and the Portland chapter of the American Society of Safety Engineers.
