

Five Indicted By Grand Jury

Five persons were named in the seven indictments returned Tuesday afternoon by the county grand jury.

Heading the list was Paul Remington, 38, of Portland, who was charged with burglary not in a dwelling in connection with the night of March 7 Remington was arrested in Portland by state police the day after the robbery of a jewelry store at the corner of 1st and 2nd streets. His apprehension, however, was withheld in the hope of making additional arrests.

Ralph C. Higgins, 36, of Portland was held on three felony indictments in connection with the robbery of a jewelry store recently. He was arrested Tuesday.

Other indictments were: Lester Long, 41, of Forest Grove, assault with intent to commit rape; Delmar Vogt, 19, of North Plains, contributing to the delinquency of a minor; and Spencer N. Whitney, 30, of Portland, larceny in connection with the theft of a typewriter at Tigar.

All of the men indicted were arraigned Wednesday morning in the circuit court. Long pleaded guilty and sentence was postponed. Higgins asked time to consult an attorney and all others entered pleas of not guilty.

Robert F. Pierce, 19, of Portland was sentenced to a year in the county jail Monday by Circuit Judge R. Frank Peters. He was indicted for larceny.
