Friendly Six Plan Annual Meeting

The balloon having burst, but the parachute, about three feet in diameter, and its load, intact. Attached to the parachute were two small boxes, weather proofed, and containing recording instruments and the other, four batteries and an aerial, apparently a transmitting station in miniature. Inside one of the boxes was the date "10-9-43," the word "army" and several numbers. The find was turned over to Portland authorities.

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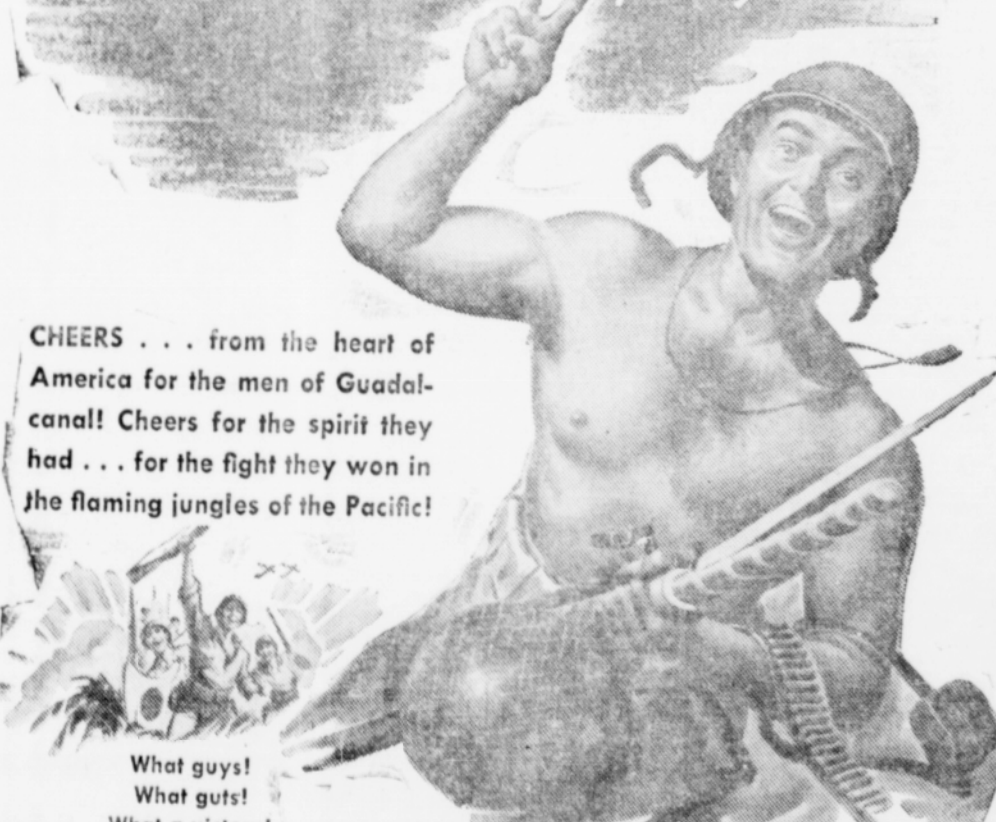
