Medal Given to Flyer's Family

BUXTON-MANNING—An air medal was delivered to Mr. and Mrs. A. E. Rye and their daughter-in-law, Mrs. Floyd Rye, at their home in the Manning vicinity March 19 by Major Benson and Lt. Way of the Portland air base. The medal was awarded in October, 1943, to T. Sgt. Floyd V. Rye with the army air forces in England for "exceptionally meritorious achievement, while participating in five separate bomber combat missions over enemy occupied continental Europe."

T. Sgt. Rye, only son of Mr. and Mrs. Rye, has been a prisoner of the Germans since October 4, 1943. The Rye family rejoiced last week when they received a letter and two cards from their son in his own handwriting stating that he was "O.K." and for them not to worry. The messages were all written in November. This is the first direct word they have had from him.

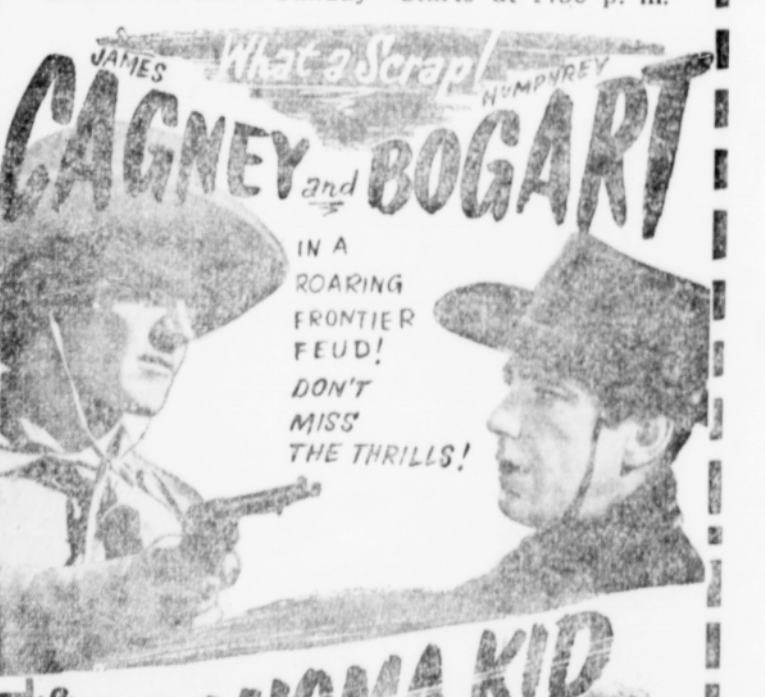
