Johnson Files For Two Posts

J. O. Johnson of Tigard is staging a dual campaign between now and the primary elections May 18—he is seeking the republican nomination as state representative from Washington county and election as a delegate at large for the republican national convention at Chicago.

A former county state representative, Johnson is campaigning for renomination to the post with a brief platform—"Common sense legislation only. The fewer the laws, the better the government."

In his declaration for delegate, he states that he will help nominate "a fighting American of proven Christian character" and assist in adopting a platform which will provide for "Return to the states, administration of all activities of government as intended by our Constitution. Return of government by law instead of government by executive order. Establishment of permanent courts for settlement of problems of industry, labor and agriculture through collective bargaining with adequate protection for the average citizen. Permanent international organization established on the theory that all men are created equal and that all problems, both economic and political, can and must be settled by arbitration. A job for every returned soldier through co-operation with business instead of government dole."

Johnson is an attorney and business man. For 15 years he has been practicing law with offices in Portland and for several years at Tigard. He is also president of the Sken Electric Works. He is a past commander of the West Hills legion post of Multnomah and past president of the Tigard Lions club. He belongs to various civic and fraternal organizations in Metzger, Tigard and Sherwood and is director and attorney for the Washington Federal Savings & Loan association of Hillsboro.

He was a federal employee in the bureau of internal revenue for 11 years. He served as representative in Washington county in 1933.

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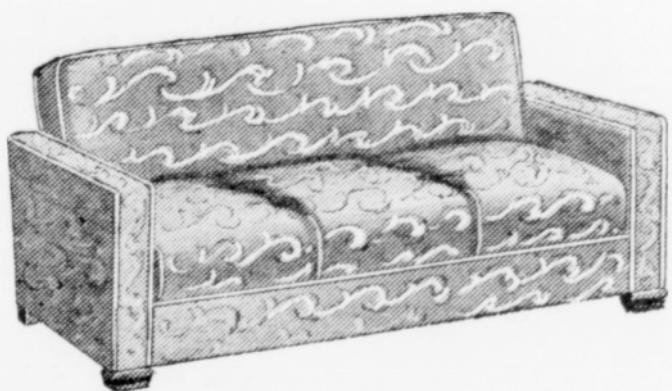
