

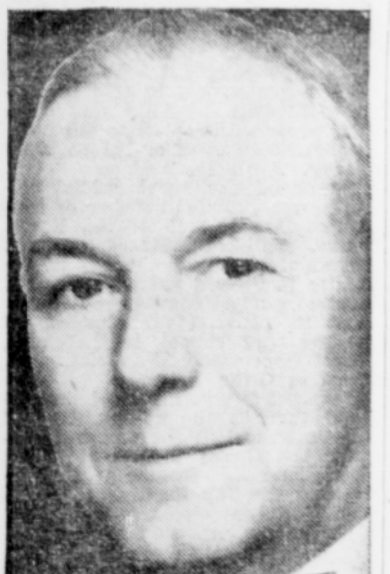
### Aloha Grange Installs Nine New Members
