

Data Sought On Need for Local Airline

Hearings by the Civil Aeronautics board on the inclusion of Hillsboro on Pacific coast area (feeder) airlines now under consideration, will be held within 90 days, according to word received from Southwest Airways April 29 already has been set by the board as the date for a pre-hearing conference on Southwest's application. This will be followed by formal hearings within 30 to 60 days, the company predicted.

Extension of air transportation through this new type of service, which links smaller communities to their natural trading centers and also feeds passenger, mail and express traffic to trunk airlines, this is moving with unprecedented speed. The Pacific coast becomes the first area in the entire nation to be considered for feeder routes.

Next step in the program to insure that Hillsboro is sanctioned for service was outlined in a letter from James G. Ray, Southwest vice-president. He declared that a questionnaire covering economic data which the board will require for judging Hillsboro's need for air service would be mailed within a few days, then followed with the statement:

"We are very pleased to report this speeding-up of the government's plans for establishing feeder air services. All that remains to be done now is for us to prove the need for it. We are confident the need exists, and that an adequate presentation of the economic data will put your community on the air map."

of hearing the people criticized for complacency when the trouble could be traced to Washington, D. C., and the withholding of key war incidents until the perspective was lost. He advocated a congressional investigation of the withholding of news facts from the people.

Tardy release of war news leads to a lack of war morale, stated Hoyt, who was formerly director of the domestic bureau and office of war information. Without the proper morale, the public is not ready to go through the Gethsemane of the peace, will not realize that appeasement or a negotiated peace would be an axis victory.

The speaker contended. The news of the day must be properly presented with the joy of victory and the sorrow of defeat if the people are to realize how small are their inconveniences as compared to the sacrifices of the fighting men who are giving their lives, he continued.

News coverage of the war got off to a bad start when the news of the Pearl Harbor disaster had to be suppressed in the interests of national security, Hoyt pointed out. After that the bad news was seldom released promptly to the people and censorship was too often used to cover military mistakes.

The speaker declared. He cited the General Patton incident, the Barri bombing and the shooting down of American paratroopers by our own guns as incidents where news withholding upset public morale and injured the war effort.

Hoyt was introduced by Paul Patterson, a friend since they were students at University of Oregon together.
