Approximately 40 persons, representing 10 local Parent-Teacher associations, were present but due to the gasoline rationing most of these associations represented the northeastern end of Washington county.

The year's final reports were received from both the representatives of the local associations and the county council chairman. Those associations, which have already elected their officers, were asked to introduce them to the group if present.

In the afternoon Mrs. C. E. Zollinger, a member of the "Boys and Girls" council of Portland, spoke on "Boys and Girls." Students and teachers need the feeling that they are a part of the war effort and what they are doing is just as important as some of the things that sound more glamorous, it was pointed out.

Mrs. Sayre spoke of the conference that is being held in Portland April 25, 26 and 27 in the Mulhennah hotel by the Oregon Congress of Parent-Teachers. Mrs. Sayre installed the officers.
