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Refrigerator Car Purchase Planned

Expenditure of nearly \$15,000,000 during 1944 for new refrigerator cars and repairs to its present rolling stock has been authorized for Pacific Fruit Express company by its joint owners, Southern Pacific and Union Pacific railroads, it was announced yesterday.

The program provides for purchase of 1,990 new cars at an estimated cost of about \$5,500,000. It is hoped that delivery of much of this new equipment for transportation of perishable shipments will be completed this year to help handle an expected increase over PFE's all-time record of 411,000 cars loaded in 1943.

General repairs and maintenance to existing equipment will run to more than \$9,000,000 and will be done in the Pacific Fruit Express company's shops, it was stated.

The new cars will be constructed with steel frames, sheathing, ends and roofs, and will be equipped with convertible bunkers which can be collapsed to increase loading space when bunker ice is not used.

Now the largest operator of refrigerator cars in the world, the Pacific Fruit Express had 36,294 refrigerator cars in service January 1, 1944.

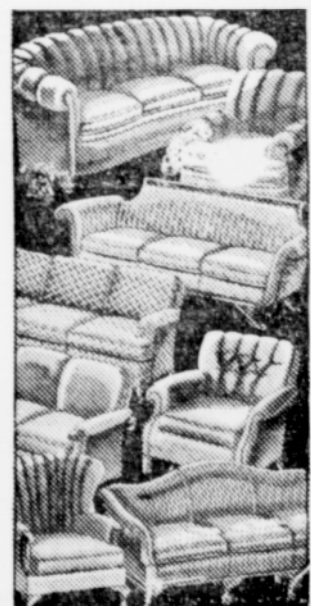

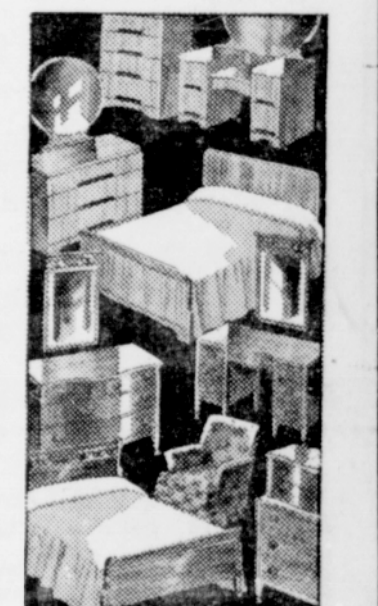
