Italy, according to word received by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Bascomb. He has been wounded twice.

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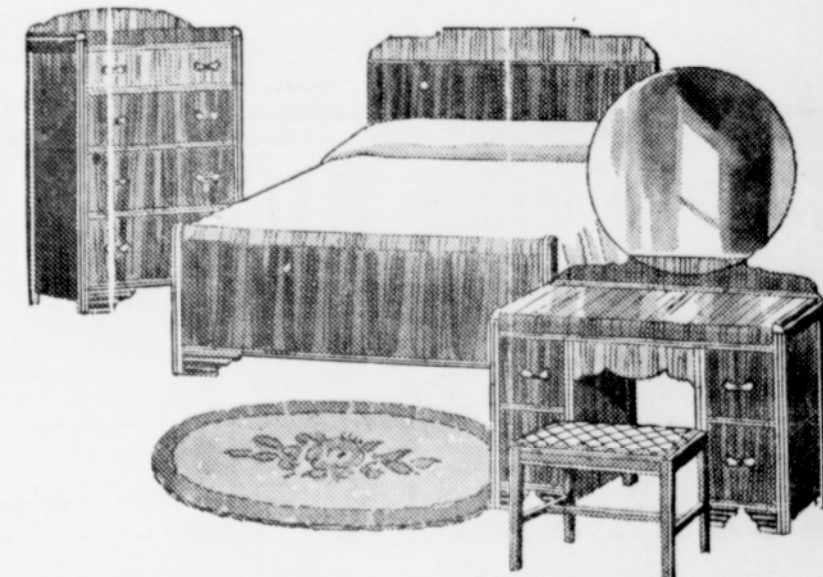
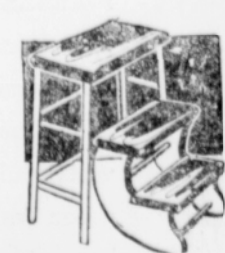
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
