EVERYBODY LIKES FRESH BERRY JAM

Save Sugar and Berries
with This Easy Recipe

6 Cups Ground Berries
(Any Variety)
8½ Cups Sugar
1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

Wash, stem and grind 3 quarts fully ripe berries, or crush completely one layer at a time so that each berry is reduced to pulp. Measure exactly 6 level cups crushed berries, (add water to fill out last cup, if necessary), into a large kettle. Add M.C.P. Pectin, stir well and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. NOW, add the sugar (which has been previously measured), mix well and bring to a full rolling boil. BOIL, EXACTLY 4 MINUTES. Remove from fire, let boil subside, stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes. Pour into sterilized jars, allowing ½-inch space for sealing with fresh paraffin. (NOTE: For Strawberry Jam, add ¼ cup lemon juice to each 6 cups crushed berries.)
