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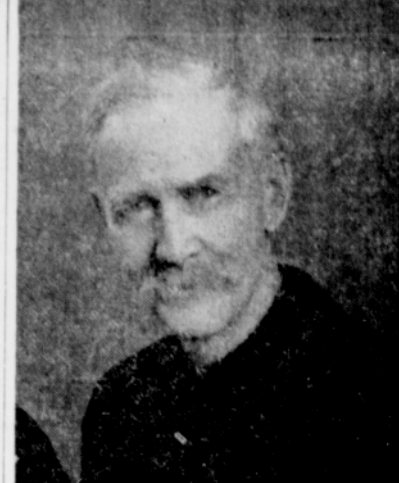

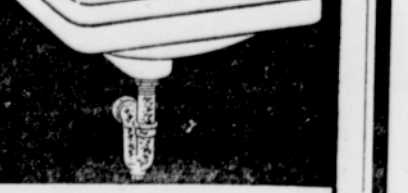

Reduction Set On Power Bills

Customers of the Portland General Electric company will receive an 86 per cent discount on their current bills for one month as a means of returning to customers some of the unusual earnings during the current period, according to the current period, according to the current period, according to the current period.

The reduction applies to all bills with the exception of a few customers under special contract, it was explained.

The order arose from an action by the Portland Consumers group asking for lower electrical rates.

"It is clearly understood," Plagg declared, "that this is a temporary arrangement to return to customers of the electric companies some of the unusual earnings during the current period and the amount returned will be somewhat in excess of the amount asked for in the emergency rate reduction order."

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School Board to Meet

New Basis Set For Computing Fuel Oil Ration

Next season's fuel oil rations for heating stoves will be figured on a new basis, Charles B. Maxfield, district OPA fuel rationing representative, announced today, in order to cut down over-issuance and conserve critically short supplies of kerosene and stove oil.

Over-all ceilings for heating stove rations will be established under a new calculation table, and local boards, in computing the ration, will be empowered to issue rations below the ceilings, according to the minimum needs in each case.

If the consumer finds he cannot get by after making every possible effort to live within his ration, the board may revise its estimates and give him additional oil up to the ceiling figures, Maxfield explained.

New methods will also be used in figuring next season's hot water rations, as follows:

The hot water is supplied by an attachment to a heater, stored in or cooking equipment, the renewed ration for each piece of equipment will be figured by multiplying the number of months the ration is

needed by 10 gallons. Where the hot water is furnished by separate water heating equipment, the ration will be calculated by adding 20 gallons for the first person, and five gallons for each additional person living at the house, multiplying that sum by the number of months for which the ration is needed, and taking two-thirds of the resultant figure.
