## Fine Medical Help Provided

HEADQUARTERS, EUROPEAN THEATER OF OPERATIONS—The best medical facilities ever assembled to serve men of American armies will be available to United States troops when Allied armies begin the push to crack Hitler's European fortress.

Prepared for any eventuality, the United States Army Medical Corps is equipped with many life saving devices and medicines unknown in World War I.

Through use of new developments a front line soldier, under average conditions, can be placed in a bed and attended by medical experts within 10 hours after he has received a wound.

The speed and efficiency of the medical department were demonstrated recently in training maneuvers in Northern Ireland under the roughest simulated battle conditions. Organization of the highest degree is necessary to make all this possible.

Major Saul Fortunoff, New Rochelle, N. Y., head of a "clearing company" said, following the demonstrations, Major Fortunoff's company is a part of a larger group commanded by Lieut. Col. Orval T. Needals, Kansas City, Mo.

The demonstration showed that the wounded soldier is picked up on the battle field by litter bearers and carried to the nearest first aid station.
