RAISIN-LEMON PIE

2 eggs
1 1/2 cups sugar
1/4 cup cornstarch
1/2 cup milk

1 cup raisins
1 cup lemon juice
1 tsp. grated lemon rind
1 tsp. butter or margarine

Beat egg yolks slightly in top of double boiler; add 1 cup of the sugar and the cornstarch; mix well. Add milk gradually, stirring until smooth. Add raisins, lemon juice, lemon rind, and butter or margarine. Cook over rapidly boiling water about 15 minutes, or until thickened, stirring frequently. Cook pour into baked 9-inch pastry shell. Make meringue by beating egg whites until stiff, gradually add remaining sugar, beating until mixture holds peaks. Spread roughly on pie. Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) 15 minutes, or until brown.
