

Berry Growers Seek Changes Ceiling Prices

Adjustment of strawberry ceiling prices was requested by Oregon growers Monday who appeared before the district OPA office in Portland. Charles Nelson of Dixie Mountain attended the session as representative of Washington county growers.

Request was made that all price ceilings below the consumer level be removed, or that producer ceilings in Oregon and Washington be raised materially to the level for Idaho and California. The growers' committee, headed by Martin Tompkins, Oregon state grange master, contended that the present \$1.50 ceiling for nine-pound crates reflects a WFA attempt to divert berries from the fresh consumer market to processors.

The district OPA price division does not have the authority to grant the adjustments requested, it was explained. However, the recommendation is to be forwarded to Washington, D. C.

Pending any adjustment, effective berry prices are: a. b. country shipping point, \$1.50 per crate, delivered to wholesaler or wholesale market, \$1.61; delivered to retail store, \$2.01 per crate, sold direct to consumer, \$2.01 per crate, plus one-third mark-up. Retail store prices must not exceed 23 cents a box.

The annual hearing of the Oregon State Game Commission regarding prospective hunting regulations will be held at 10 a. m. June 10, at the commission office in 618 Oregon building, Portland.

Under consideration will be seasons, bag limits and other regulations concerning game birds and game animals, and anyone interested is invited to attend.

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WFA Continues Price Support Plan on Eggs

War food administration has announced that it will continue to purchase eggs to support producer price levels in spite of the fact that suitable cold storage space is inadequate, according to reports received by Palmer S. Torvend, county agent from extension poultrymen N. L. Bennion, Oregon State College.

The report states that the WFA intends to carry out the pledge of the government to farmers to support egg prices. It has recently indicated that it may be necessary to convert some eggs into animal feed due to lack of storage facilities as the high rate of production is continuing for quite a lengthy season.

However, Bennion reports that laying hens are going to market at a rapid rate. From present indications it appears that Oregon will have approximately 30 per cent less chicks this year as compared to a year ago. This, together with the reduction in laying flocks, indicates that the present egg surplus will soon be over.

Consumers can help the present situation by eating more eggs and producers are urged to eliminate the culls and low producing hens. Trends in the poultry situation generally could easily be the reverse by fall.

AAA Announces Austrian Pea Support Prices

Support prices for the 1944 Austrian winter pea crop have been announced by the western division of the AAA, according to reports received by Palmer S. Torvend, county agent.

Producers' prices are to be the same as were in effect last year. Peas will also be purchased from dealers at producers' prices plus 40 per cent hundred weight for handling charges. These purchases will be made in minimum carload quantities upon dealers' certification that producers were paid basic producer price for each component lot in shipment.

This action has been taken in order to be sure that growers who are raising Austrian winter field peas this year will receive as much for them as those received in 1943. States Torvend, although the acreage of peas in this county is much smaller than it has been in the past. According to the announcement there is a large carry-over from the 1943 crop and, therefore, the support price has been announced.

County Senator Denies Holman Political Hint

Denial of intimations by U. S. Representative Holman that the candidacy of State Senator Earl E. Fisher of Beaverton in the recent republican primary election was inspired by a move by Holman was issued this week by Fisher.

"Senator Earl E. Fisher of Washington county in reply to U. S. Senator Holman's allegations questioning his motives in filing for U. S. senator in recent primary campaign in Oregon, according to press reports, says: 'He will have to deny the allegations with the alibi; that his campaign expenses were \$572.65 and he did not pass the 151'.

"Senator Fisher, who served 12 years in Oregon legislatures and states: 'It is good public policy for Oregon—to be present when the clerk calls the roll—in Salem and in Washington.'"

"He reminds Senator Holman not to be alarmed because one of the commonest peaches in the world is the one that grows in the state of Oregon. Senator Fisher was the third man in the race for the republican nomination to the United States senate, behind Wayne L. Morse defeated Holman.

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
