He has been decorated with the Distinguished Service Cross, and has flown 28 missions against Germany, including operations against Bremen, Brunswick, Schweinfurt, Emden, and Berlin. He also wears the air medal and three oak leaf clusters. He was transferred from the infantry to the A. F. in August 1943.

Fifth War Loan To Open Monday

zen of the county to dig down deeper than ever before to invest in victory. Quota for other sales to individuals has been set at \$1,000,000 and to corporations \$307,000.

"The tempo of our financing program must keep pace with the ferocity of our efforts on the battle fronts," the chairman declared in announcing plans to meet the current big quota. "We must realize that every dollar invested in war bonds and other government securities brings the end of the war that much closer—that every minute saved saves lives. Back the attack—buy more than before!"

Meeting the Washington county quota will require an average investment of at least \$100 for every man, woman and child in the area, the chairman stated.

Magnitude of the war financing job facing the American people is demonstrated by the fact that Oregon's fifth war loan quota of \$125,000,000 will keep the war going only 12 hours according to Christensen and MacKenzie. On this basis, Washington county's quota will pay the cost of our war effort for a little over 12 minutes.

County goal has been broken down into six area quotas as follows: Hillsboro, \$334,000; Forest Grove, \$572,000; Sherwood, \$145,000; Tigard, \$222,000; Beaverton, \$308,000; and Banks, \$118,800. Area quotas are broken down further into school districts of the county.

Area chairmen for the drive are: J. L. Seary, Hillsboro; E. L. Paldanius, Forest Grove; Ferd Langer, Sherwood; W. M. Evans, Tigard; Jay Gibson and Mrs. Robert Summers, Beaverton; and George Laver, Banks. "Kick-off" meetings for Victory Volunteers in each of these areas were conducted this week by Christensen and MacKenzie and a county wide gathering of solicitors is planned at the Venetian theatre in Hillsboro Friday night.

Although a recent report regarding the sale of bonds in the nation indicated that sales have dropped and redemptions increased during the past few months, the redemption record since March, 1935, through April, 1944, shows only \$34 per cent on total sales of \$31,351,000,000.

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County Record On Bond Drives 100 Per Cent

Washington county has never failed to oversubscribe a war bond drive quota and it will not fail in the coming campaign, declared W. C. Christensen, co-chairman of the county war finance committee, in speaking on the Fifth war loan drive Wednesday at the local Lions club Hillsboro quota in the drive which opens Monday and continues through July 8 is \$334,000, he said.

The war effort is made up of three fronts, Christensen declared, the fighting front, the production front and the financial front. All three must carry the assigned load for victory.

Carrying on the war now costs \$8,000,000,000 a month, more than 16 times the cost of the Panama canal, according to the speaker. Taxes account for \$43,000,000,000 a year and the remaining \$8,000,000,000 must be raised by the sale of bonds. These securities not only help finance the war, but prevent inflation which is coming closer to the people to their savings.

Complacency on the part of the public is being offset by the fact that the war is coming closer to home, the speaker declared. Almost every home has some one in the armed services.
