Annual Red Cross Meeting Adjourned To Next Thursday

The annual Red Cross meeting which was held last Thursday night at headquarters was adjourned to Thursday evening, June 22, to complete the business of the year and elect officers.

Mrs. Rose Hurd, who has been secretary for six years and home service chairman of the Red Cross, tendered her resignation to become effective July 1. Mrs. Hurd is secretary for the county court and after July 1 will also act as secretary to the county juvenile officer, Harold Meyer.

Mrs. Emma Mae Erickson, field representative for Oregon, gave an address, explaining some changes and requirements made by headquarters of Pacific area. Highlights of the year's reports include:

Home service, Mrs. Rose Hurd, chairman—From July 1, 1943 to May 31, 1944, 1158 cases, 536 cases closed, 81 re-opened. Money paid to home war service families, \$125,432.42.

Motor corps, Mrs. R. W. Well, chairman—Initial cost of station wagon, an interest for month, \$1,528.75; repairs, gas, etc., brought total to \$2,108.48. Balance in bank June 1, \$30.63. She also gave an itemized list of trips made, and purposes thereof.

Nutrition and Canteen, Mrs. John Kovaly—Three canteen units, Hillsboro, Beaverton and Forest Grove groups, have served twice monthly at the blood donor center. Of the 80 members in these units 41 are active and have given 2 and 1144 hours service. June 1, 1943 to June 1, 1944. On deposit in the bank, the Hillsboro canteen unit has \$33.86, money earned by training classes in serving chamber of commerce dinners.

Junior Red Cross, Mrs. L. T. McPherson—1107 articles made for service men.

Camp and Hospital Service, Mrs. E. A. Griffith—Cash outlay for hospital and camp furnishings, 1943, to June 1, 1944, \$1,500.62; balance cash on hand, \$682.42. An itemized account was given.

First Aid, Paul Ringle—First aid classes held and certificates granted: Tigard grade school, junior course, 38; May Seiklin, instructor; Forest Grove high school, standard course, Dorothy Withycombe, instructor; Mountaineer standard course, Max Throp, instructor; Thruway instructor, Earl Crane; Forest Grove high school, has a class of 30 which has not been handed in. Two new instructor cards have been issued, making 14 instructor cards.

Blood Plasma Bank, Mrs. P. Abenbroth—Blood plasma unit has made 29 visits to Hillsboro between May 31, 1943, to June 1, 1944, collecting 2621 pints of blood from Washington county donors.

Surgical Dressings, Mrs. L. R. Walker—July 1, 1943, to May 31, 1944, made and delivered to Portland Red Cross chapter, 12,411 Junior Red Cross, Mrs. Zola Morgan—7300 pupils enrolled in Junior work. Balance on hand June 8, \$38.48.

Home Nursing, Nurses Aid, Nurse Recruitment, Mrs. Corrine Pennington—Number of certificates issued, 77. Nurses aided, 117 hours. Recruitment, one navy nurse and one army nurse. Many planning to enter cadet corps.

Red Cross Asks Volunteers Train For Hospital Work

Thousands of women volunteers are requested to train for service at understaffed hospitals as nurses aides and dietitian's aides. Miss Corrine Pennington, county chairman, nurse's training of American Red Cross announced this week. Many thousands already have completed training and are on duty in civilian hospitals, helping to ease a serious wartime shortage of professionals.

Nurses' aides also serve in some veterans' hospitals, army hospitals and domestic hospitals of busy hospitals. Dietitian's aides now are working in U. S. public health services, hospitals for treatment of mental and nervous diseases, and in army hospitals and military hospitals.

Nurse's aides take on 80-hour Red Cross training course. After qualifying they serve in uniform under supervision of registered nurses, taking pulse and temperature of patients, giving bed baths, assisting in emergency rooms and performing various other tasks.

Members of the Volunteer Dietitian's Aide Corps also are trained and uniformed, and serve under professional supervision. They prepare food, weigh special diets, arrange trays and carry them to patients, check kitchen supplies, and assist with other duties required to keep up careful food service for patients.

Both nurse's aides and dietitian's aides serve without pay. Candidates may apply at their local Red Cross chapter.
