Flood Control Bill Passes in House
WASHINGTON, D. C.—The post-war flood control bill which passed the house last week carried the largest authorization for flood control in Oregon that have been provided in any previous bill, according to Congressman James W. Mott, republican of Oregon, who sponsored most of the flood control legislation included in the bill for that state.

Congressman Mott said the Oregon authorization totaled \$21,500,000 and covered the Willamette, Columbia, Coquille, and Nehalem river valleys.

Of this amount \$20,000,000 goes to the Willamette project which includes all the tributaries of that river, and embraces the counties of Marion, Polk, Benton, Yamhill, Washington, Clackamas and part of Columbia. It is a multi-purpose project which provides for irrigation and navigation as well as flood control.

Trainees Sought By Civil Service
Trainees are being sought by the United States Civil Service commission to work for the National Bureau of Standards in Washington, D. C., as technical aids in order to develop.

Starting salary is \$1970 a year, including overtime pay, and promotion will be made at the successful completion of a training period, to positions paying \$2190 a year, including overtime pay.

No experience or education is required for these positions, although persons who have had high school physics or a trade school course in mechanics or electricity are especially wanted.

There is no maximum age limit, but applicants must be 18 years old unless they live in Washington, D. C., or within a 50-mile radius, in which case they may apply if they are 16. Applicants must also be citizens of the United States and must pass a written test.

Applications must be filed with the United States Civil Service commission, Washington, D. C., on or before July 31, 1944. Persons using their highest skills in war work should not apply. Federal appointments are made in accordance with War Manpower commission policies and employment stabilization programs.

The Civil Service commission has also announced that applications for training specialist, \$2600 to \$5600, plus overtime pay, must be filed on or before May 22, 1944. Applications will not be accepted after that date.

Announcements and application forms may be obtained from the commission's local secretary, Fred Holmgren, at Hillsboro postoffice, or from the United States Civil Service commission, Washington 25, D. C.

Inspection School Busses Scheduled
SALEM—Inspection of the 700 school busses operating in Oregon is to be made during the coming summer school vacation with a view to providing the greatest possible degree of safety for their young passengers, and for determining where new busses may be allocated to replace units of equipment found to be obsolete.

The department of education is said to be sponsoring the investigation, and the state police department will be asked to conduct the study, beginning with the close of the current school term.

On the report to be made by the state police will hinge the granting of operating permits for busses to be used during the investigation year beginning next September. It is pointed out that the Oregon law requires that the operators of school busses, as well as of all motor vehicles, pass an inspection and secure the approval of the state police before Public Utilities Commissioner George H. Flagg may issue operating permits.

It is also understood that the interstate commerce commission will conduct its own study of the needs of school districts in awarding new replacements that have been allocated to the state out of 4,000 busses to be manufactured to supply the needs of all the states in replacing worn out equipment.
