

Decision Favors Cities in Suit Over Road Fund

Tantamount to a final decision was the ruling by Circuit Judge R. Frank Peters Friday of the demurrer filed by the county in the action brought by Hillsboro and Forest Grove for a declaratory judgment relative to municipalities' right to share in the road tax money collected by the county.

Washington county has filed a demurrer raising the question that the facts in the cities' complaint were not sufficient to constitute a cause of action. The ruling by the court holds the facts are sufficient under existing laws to give the cities right to at least 50 per cent of the fund.

The complaint filed by the cities set forth that each municipality constitutes a separate road district, that the law provides for assessing a tax on all taxable property for general road fund purposes and that not less than 50 per cent of the amount collected be apportioned to road districts, including districts composed of municipalities, in such proportion as the amount of taxable property bears to the whole amount of taxable property in the county. Ordinarily 75 per cent of the amount collected is paid to cities.

Under terms of Oregon laws providing for setting up of sinking funds, the county court set up an \$85,000 sinking fund for post war purposes. The 75 per cent share was segregated for the cities, but the county treasurer refused to pay out the money until her authority to do so was clarified. She held that she should withhold from this money the proportion which should go into the post war sinking fund without division with municipalities. Requirements of the sinking fund had been fully met. It was contended that the cities were not entitled to share in that portion of the fund which represented the amount collected for the post war sinking fund.

While the circuit judge's ruling did not constitute a final disposition of the suit, it is tantamount to a final decision of the issue, according to P. L. Patterson, local attorney who represented the cities.

least a \$100 bond for every man, woman and child in Washington county. This would make it possible for the county to meet its goal of \$164,000 in series E bonds the securities being emphasized by the government.

E Bonds Stressed

These series E bonds sell at 75 per cent of maturity value in denominations of \$25 to \$1,000. They mature in 10 years from issue date and yield 2 1/2 per cent interest if held to maturity. However, this is not the only type of security sold in the campaign—there are bonds to fit almost every need and every pocketbook, according to the chairman.

Hillsboro launched the campaign Monday morning at 9 o'clock when every whistle and siren in the city was sounded, automobile horns joined in and bells were rung. Large sidewalk signs were painted in front of the city's five business agencies—the Commercial National bank, First National bank of Portland, Wells Department store and the Washington Federal Savings & Loan association and post office.

Following the series of noon meetings last week of members of the Hillsboro war finance committee, local retail stores were given quotas of sales to the public and all Hillsboro concerns received a goal for purchases by employees.

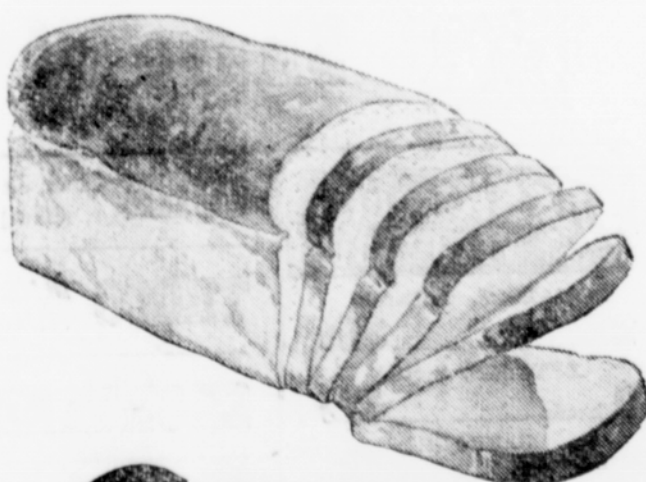
Residents reported that the plane's engine faltered and then failed shortly before the crash. The pilot bailed out at about 10:30 a. m.

One Draft Pool For Inductees Set After July 1

Selective service registrants will be placed in a single pool following their induction physical examinations beginning July 1, according to a draft announcement reaching this week. Formerly registrants were categorized for either the army or navy, but beginning July 1 they will be placed in a common pool to be drawn upon according to the needs of the services.

The new procedure will permit draft boards to fill each call by selecting available non-fathers ahead of fathers, it was explained. Men will be inducted in accordance with their order number as provided by law.

Halt was called to the sending up for induction of any men who have been classified as fit for limited service only unless ordered to do so by the state selective service director. The army has been accepting limited service registrants up to five per cent of the monthly calls. The navy has not been taking any.

Since the first of the year men who have been accepted have been assigned to one branch or the other at the induction station. Manpower demands of the individual services governed the date of an inductee's order to report. It has been impossible to withdraw men from the two pools at an even rate, making it possible for fathers to be taken by the navy while non-fathers in the same community were not being taken by the navy.

Auto Use Tax Stamps Sold At Postoffice

Federal auto use tax in the denomination of \$5 are now on sale in all postoffices and at the office of the collector of internal revenue in Portland, according to J. W. Mahoney, collector of internal revenue. The stamps will evidence payment of the tax for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1944, and must be purchased on or before that date.

Use on the public highway of an automobile, truck, motorcycle or bus makes it subject to the tax. The tax stamp is transferable with the motor vehicle. If the vehicle is in storage or out of use in July, it will become subject to tax as of the month in which it is placed in use on the public highway.

The stamps are serially numbered, gummed on the face and have provision on the back for entry of the make, model, serial number and state license number of the motor vehicle. In Oregon all stamps are required to be placed in the upper left-hand corner of the inside of the windshield.

Postoffices will sell the stamps

over the counter for cash only and no mail order business with respect thereto will be conducted by the postoffice. When auto tax stamps are ordered from the collector if internal revenue, Portland, payment may be made by postoffice money order, certified check or cash. Uncertified checks cannot be accepted.

Failure to purchase and display the new tax stamp on vehicles used on the public highway on or after July 1, 1944, will subject the violators to severe penalties imposed by law.
