Canning, Freezing Recipes Outlined For Strawberries

Many people prefer strawberries preserved by freezing rather than by canning. Freezer packs taste more nearly like the fresh product than the canned berries.

To prepare strawberries for freezing, gather berries in cool of morning, handle quickly, and rush to freezer locker as soon as possible. Four hours or less from garden to locker is a good rule. Wash berries, handle quickly, and rush to freezer locker as soon as possible. Strawberries may be packed either in syrup or dry sugar.

For the dry sugar pack use one-half cup of sugar per quart of berries. Distribute sugar evenly over fruit. This may be done in a bowl or directly in container for freezing. Fill containers to top if there is air space between fruit pieces. Seal immediately.

To make war-time syrup for the syrup pack allow one cup of water and one-half cup of sugar for each quart of fruit. If a little extra sugar can be spared from some other fruit use it for the strawberries. Add sugar to water, stir until dissolved, and bring to boil. Cool thoroughly. Place strawberries in container. Add cold syrup to within one-half inch of top for short pints, one inch for tall pints, and one and one-half inches for quart containers. Be sure to cover fruit with syrup. Seal immediately.

The berries may be packed in glass jars with tight covers, lacquered tin cans, or special storage waxed paper containers. Best flavor is obtained by keeping quality berries in airtight containers. Always close tin cans and paper containers immediately after packing, and then bring to boil slowly. Put lids in place before freezing and fasten down after freezing. Rubber rings on glass jars improve fastening by keeping air out.

To can strawberries: Sprinkle sugar over the washed and hulled berries. Let stand until juice is running, then bring to boil slowly. Let boil from one to three minutes. Use the longer time for firmer and larger berries. Next morning bring to boil. Pack into hot containers and process for 10 minutes in hot water bath. The same method may be used for other fruits that are soft. Strawberries are better if a little more sugar is used than the war-time ration of one-half cup to one quart of fruit. It is recommended that we use a little less for some of the other fruits and use a little more in the strawberries. Mrs. VanWinkle, war food assistant, recommends that two-thirds cup of sugar be used to a quart of strawberries.

EVERYBODY LIKES FRESH BERRY JAM

Save Sugar and Berries with This Easy Recipe

6 Cups Ground Berries (Any Variety)
8 1/2 Cups Sugar
1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

Wash, stem and grind 3 quarts fully ripe berries, or crush completely one layer at a time so that each berry is reduced to pulp. Measure exactly 6 level cups crushed berries, (add water to fill out last cup, if necessary), into a large kettle. Add M.C.P. Pectin, stir well and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. NOW, add the sugar (which has been previously measured), mix well and bring to a full rolling boil. BOIL EXACTLY 4 MINUTES. Remove from fire, let boil subside, stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes. Pour into sterilized jars, allowing 1/2-inch space for sealing with fresh paraffin. (NOTE: For Strawberry Jam, add 1/4 cup lemon juice to each 6 cups crushed berries.)
