Camp Fire Corner

Jackie Barney of Kawanit Alan Horizon group conducted her section cooking lesson Wednesday afternoon at the home of Mrs. A. L. Schulerich, guardian of Namanu group. There are seven girls in this cooking class and they are earning home craft honors in the way. In this lesson they made three kinds of hot beverages.

Mrs. Jim Burns, guardian of Westwind Bluebird group, returned Monday morning from an extended visit in Texas. She announced at the time that she would resume the meetings at school.

Okiki Camp Fire group met with their guardian Tuesday afternoon and experimented with the artful "finger painting" technique. A special point is applied to paper, then wetted thoroughly. After this treatment, one only has to either dip with the fingers or draw them lightly across the paper to produce shading forms and designs. The girls plan to decorate the frontispiece of their Camp Fire notebook with this sort of designing.

Mrs. Paul Patterson, guardian of Okiki group, plans to discontinue their meetings until the middle part of July. She is going to California for a visit with relatives.

The class in hospital techniques will be discontinued until fall unless more girls have time to attend. There are enough girls signed up at present to form two classes, but they have summertime jobs that leave them little free time. The age limit is 12 years.

Horizon girls will be permitted to attend a few classes in a Portland hospital upon completion of a few basic requirements. There is a leather honor awarded for satisfactory work in this project.

Five of the girls in Namanu group have completed the requirements for Trailseeker's rank. They will appear singly before the committee of awards as soon as time can be arranged. They hope to win their beads and rank at a Council Fire at Camp Adahi, this summer. The girls in this group have signed up 80 per cent for camp sessions already.

At their meeting last Wednesday the girls taking cooking lessons, served biscuits and cocoa to the others. Fortunes were told to complete the social half of the program.
