Speaker Tells of Relocation Camp

CORNELIUS—At the Cornelius Methodist church Sunday Mrs. Enoch Dumas, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. C. H. Schreiber, was the speaker. She gave a most interesting and enlightening talk on "Life and Conditions and Problems of a Japanese Relocation Center."

Mrs. Dumas is a most qualified speaker on the subject as the family lives within a center in Colorado where Mr. Dumas supervises the teaching staff.

Mrs. Dumas said that the relocation center consisted of 36 blocks, with 15 buildings to a block, including a high school, grade and high school, office, recreation buildings, and apartments for the officials of the center.

Mrs. Dumas stressed the fact that the relocation center is not a prison camp, or not an internment camp, but merely a center where Japanese-Americans have been relocated for the duration of the war in areas not so vulnerable as the coast.

The evacuees are allowed to observe the religions which they believe in and other religious services are conducted in the recreation halls. The people practice some Christian faith.

The schools are conducted by the regulations of the state where they are located. There are ample hospital facilities and this service is all free.

All healthy adults are urged to work in the hospitals, schools, fire department, or on a farm project. They receive small wages which they may use for spending money.

Mrs. Dumas states that very little resentment is shown by these people because they have been evacuated from their homes.

Food is free to the evacuees and they have large mess halls where they eat their meals. Food is purchased on the same rationing plan as is used by all civilians. Forty-five cents per person a day is the amount allotted for food by the government.
