EVERYBODY LIKES ELDERBERRY JELLY

Save Sugar and Berries with This Easy Recipe

3 1/4 Cups Juice
4 1/2 Cups Sugar
1 Cup Lemon Juice
1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

Pick berries from stem. Wash and crush thoroughly. If they do not liberate much juice add a little water and mash again. Squeeze out juice. Measure exactly 3 1/4 cups of the squeezed juice (add water to fill out last cup, if necessary) into a large kettle. Add the M.C.P. Pectin, stir well, bring to a boil, stirring constantly. NOW, add the sugar (which has been previously measured), continue stirring and bring to a full rolling boil. BOIL EXACTLY 2 MINUTES. Remove from fire, let boil subside, skim. Pour into sterilized glasses, allowing 1/2-inch space for sealing with fresh paraffin.
