



Continuous Plan Of Conservation Sought by State

Oregon's recommendations for change of conditions in the 1943 agricultural conservation program have been submitted to the western division of the AAA by N. C. Davidson, executive assistant in the state office. The recommendations embody suggestions made by county AAA committees, state committee personnel, and the technical advisory committee of Oregon State college.

The first proposal is that no change be made in the practice of eliminating definite farm allowances, tried for the first time this year. The Oregon men believe that earlier so-called soil-building allowances seldom have any relationship to the soil conservation needs of any particular farm.

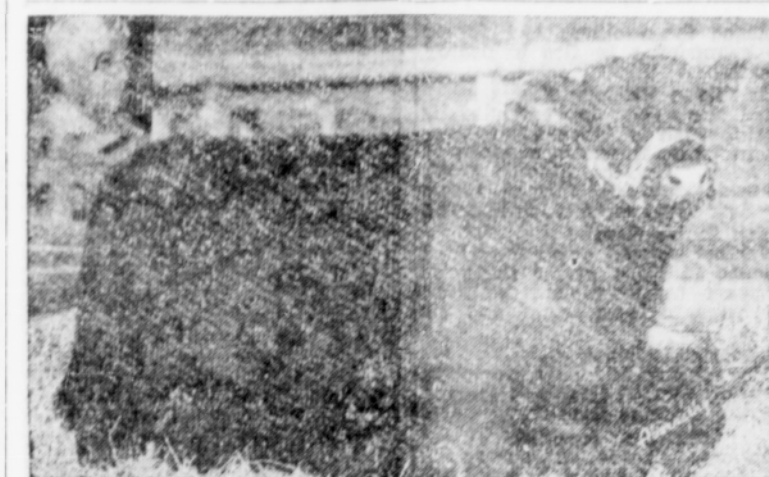
The state and county committees were also unanimous in recommending the adoption of a conservation program on a continuing basis, which would hold from year to year with only minor alterations.

The Oregon recommendations also included making and denying repeatedly that construction of liquid manure tanks be recognized as a practice because "other single practice would conserve so much fertility that is now being lost."

Food for Victory

Some things that the Victory gardener should do:

1. Give the garden that is now planted special care as to weeding, cultivating, thinning, and irrigation where it is available.
2. Plant successive crops throughout the entire garden season.
3. Keep ahead of insect pests with the approved insect control methods.
4. Plan and plant a fall and winter garden.
5. Use as many vegetables as possible when they are fresh and then can, store, or dispose of the surplus to those who are unable to grow a garden.
6. Making full use of the possibilities of your Victory garden will mean that additional plantings for fall use should be planned now.

Early Orders On Insecticides Urged by Agent

Farmers are urged to put in orders early for arsenical insecticides, according to word received from the war production board by Palmer S. Torvend, county agent. Last minute orders may result in farmers not being able to obtain the material when it is needed.

Uncertain transportation facilities, manpower shortage, and container shortages are the threats to last minute orders. Farmers are advised by the WPB that enough arsenical insecticides should be available to meet the need. In cases of extreme emergency it may be possible to get a certain amount of the material on shorter notice. Farmers should place their orders with their regular dealers at least a month before the material is to be used.

Livestock Get Vitamins from Natural Foods

Livestock producers need be little concerned over the widespread vitamin shortage now sweeping America, partly through commercial sale, appeal, according to a report issued by the nutrition committee of the American Veterinary Medical association, and concurred in, in the main, by Dr. J. R. Haa, chemist of the O. S. C. experiment station.

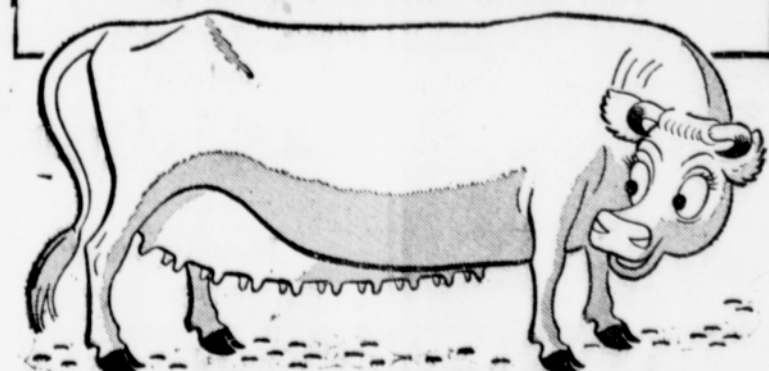
Livestock obtain most of the vitamins they need through sunshine and natural foods, provided a reasonable amount of care is exercised in selecting and processing the feeds used, the report shows. The chief exception is with poultry, where extra vitamin D is usually supplied, both by the use of fish oils and alfalfa leaf meal, except where adequate exposure to the sun makes this unnecessary.

quate supply of second-hand containers are inviting marketing problems, WFA officials warn. Potential problems in the container field are increased by the prospect of over-all fruit and vegetable production considerably in excess of 1943 when barely enough containers were available to handle these crops. WFA officials also caution that growers should be familiar with other types of containers that may be substituted for those normally used. It is highly probable that many growers will find that dealers do not have the type of containers that they prefer.

Victory Gardens Lag; Many Crops Still Possible

While figures on the number of Victory gardens in Washington county are unavailable at present, the national Victory garden campaign is far short of the goal set by the national garden advisory committee, according to County Agent Palmer S. Torvend.

O. T. McWhorter, extension horticulturist at Oregon State college, says that there is still time to plant practically everything in the garden, with the exception of peas, provided ways are available for summer irrigation. Certainly there is plenty of time for planning the fall garden. He adds that he has received reports indicating that a commercial vegetable production in many areas has been threatened by adverse weather and the late season.

The American Institute of Public Opinion has just reported that throughout the country as a whole about two and one-half million fewer gardens have been planted so far this year than last year. About 300,000 fewer families have planted gardens in the 11 western states, according to the public opinion poll. This year's national Victory garden goal was 22,000,000—two million more than last year.

This national lag in home vegetable gardens, combined with unfavorable reports of early freezes, lack of moisture and other adverse growing conditions for commercial crops in many regions, may make home victory gardens even more desirable this year than last summer, County Agent Torvend says.

Approximately two and one-half million families who had gardens last year said that they do not intend to plant this year, according to the American Institute of Public Opinion. They gave lack of space, lack of time or that they felt that gardens last year were not worth the effort among their reasons. Many of those who said they still intend to plant gardens, but it is estimated that, even assuming that all of these carry out their intention, the number of home gardens this year will still be at least two million short of the 1944 goal.

Flax Plant Men To Meet July 7

General meeting of representatives of all flax plants in Oregon has been called at Corvallis for July 7 at 2 o'clock in the Memorial Union building, announces Dr. D. D. Hill, chairman of the Oregon flax and linen board.

The meeting is to give final consideration to the proposed organization of a statewide flax trade association. Proposed articles of incorporation have been drawn up, with the assistance of Paul Carpenter, extension specialist in co-operative marketing. These will be considered for adoption or modification if final organization is agreed upon.

Leaders in the flax industry are pointing to a recent national development as indicating the need of a united voice for the Oregon flax industry. This is the announced intention of the government to sell hemp fiber at a price far below production costs. If carried out without restrictions, this might present serious competition

to the flax industry in certain fields, it is said.
