

Recreational Facilities Seen Point to Need for More Here

Hillsboro's annual Fourth of July celebration again proved to be an outstanding event of which the sponsors—the Hillsboro Firemen—as well as the community may well be proud. The big war bond rally in the afternoon with its top flight attractions and the hardworking Johnny Carpenter as master of ceremonies gave Washington county people a show that was packed with punch every minute. That it brought results is attested by the big sale of bonds.

The army detachment from Camp Adair, here for the parade and a stay at the park for several hours, was greatly appreciated as was the big navy blimp that cruised over the grounds several times early in the rally.

The parade and rodeo certainly gave evidence of the increased interest in horses in recent years. The horse parade has become an outstanding feature of the traditional celebration.

The many other events made the Firemen's "Happy Days" a well rounded program, but as usual there was the great need for increased seating capacity for the patriotic program.

Good Insurance

The socialist party at their recent convention went on record as opposing all forms of military and labor conscription. They also opposed the May bill for "peace-time conscription after the war" and the "presidential proposal for national labor slavery under the more palatable name of national service act." What would they have us do in the face of the greatest threat to America and the world that has ever been known?

Total conscription should be in effect during war as the most fair and sensible way to assure victory and prevent a slavery under the Japs and Nazis that would really be something. A plan for compulsory military training for the youth of the country in peace-time is good insurance for the preservation of America in the future.

Racket Pointed Out

The Lebanon Express calls attention to a racket practiced in Lebanon recently by two men posing as representatives of a veterans' organization, who stood on the streets selling pins with red, white and blue ribbons. Several people were "taken" before action was taken by the police and the men run out of town. The Express says in part:

"This is not a new racket. It has been worked many times before and at present there are fake veterans selling literature on the streets of Portland. It is regrettable that in times such as these, when every one is veteran conscious and willing to do all they can to aid the war heroes, that crooks resort to such a method of making money. For the most part it destroys the morale of the contributor, so that when there is a just cause to give to, he gives grudgingly or not at all, even though the veterans' organization had no responsibility in the racket, and is doing all it can to put a stop to it."

The article points out that women 35 to 65 "cannot grow their own muscular girdles." This borders on a real tragedy and something should be done about this vital question. WAVE Tells of Work
Mr. Ruth A. Hopkins (Aloha Finnell) a graduate of the Beaverton high school, who left here in November, 1941, for Washington, D. C. to do secretarial work, was later transferred to York and from there enlisted in the WAVES in 1943. Excerpts from a letter to her sister, Mrs. J. A. Will of Bandon, tell of some of her early impressions.

We (550 girls) arrived at Stillwater, Okla., half starved as we did not have breakfast on the train. Incidentally, we were told that it was the first time in the history of the railroad that any Pullman cars had ever come into Stillwater.

All of the other WAVES told us about the little old train they arrived on about a month before. It seems that it had a wood stove in the middle of the car for heat and all in all was quite ancient.

We were hauled from the station to our quarters, which were in a building that had been used for Pullman cars. We were given a tour of the building and then we were taken to our quarters.
