**Pedestrian Deaths
In State Total 21**

Motor vehicle accidents took the lives of 21 pedestrians in Oregon during the first five months of 1944, according to Secretary of State Bob Farrell. Of the 21 pedestrians killed, 13, or 62 per cent, were struck in accidents occurring in cities, while seven were killed in rural accidents.

"These figures are evidence that pedestrian safety is a rural problem, as well as an urban one," Secretary Farrell said. "The rural pedestrian accidents are the results, in most cases, of failure on the part of the person on foot to exercise proper care when crossing highways. Sixty per cent of the pedestrian fatalities so far involved unsafe actions on the part of the pedestrian."

"During the summer months, there will be many persons walking along rural highways and roads, going to or from farms for the harvest work. In many cases, pedestrians will be walking short distances along country roads. Drivers should be on the alert when driving in these areas, and the pedestrian should accept his share of the responsibility for his own safety. He can do this by walking only on the left facing traffic, and crossing highways only when he is near enough to constitute a hazard."

**Allies Make Major Gains on Western,
Eastern, Italian and Pacific Fronts**

Thursday, June 29
DeWey-Briker Named

Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York was nominated as republican presidential candidate last night at the Chicago convention on the first ballot. Gov. John Bricker of Ohio was named as running mate.

Americans Trap Japs
American troops drove deep into the northern half of Saipan island Thursday, closing a trap around the Japanese garrison on Garapan townships.

British Hit Caen
Fighting on the invasion front Thursday found the British driving to within two and a half miles of Caen. Reports indicated nazis were bringing in strategic reserves.

Friday, June 30
U. S. Drops Bombs
Diplomatic relations between the United States and Finland were severed Friday by the United States on the grounds that Finland was a puppet of nazi Germany.

Saipan Losses High
U. S. Casualties in the battle for Saipan were reported Friday as the highest so far in the Pacific—8,752 killed, wounded and missing in two weeks. Dead were listed at 1474, wounded 7,400, missing 878.

Saturday, July 1
Caen Showdown Due
Massive allied forces streamed into Caen front for showdown battle Saturday. Americans wiped out the last organized resistance on the Cherbourg peninsula.

Florence Open City
Nazis Saturday declared Florence an open city as the Germans retreated all along the Italian battle line Saturday. The Americans were 5 miles from Livorno, the battle still raged in Siena.

Japanese Attack
The Japs Saturday launched a six-pronged offensive northward from Canton to close Canton Hanow railway.

Sunday, July 2
Nazis Bolster Line
German command threw 11 divisions into the defense of Caen on the invasion coast Sunday but were not able to crack the British line. Loss of 40 Nazi tanks and hundreds of men was reported.

German in Minsk Trap
Between 200,000 and 240,000 German defenders of Minsk were surrounded Sunday as Russian columns, plunging into old Poland at the rate of 40 miles a day, cut off escape routes and advanced to within 12 1/2 miles of the city with a frontal attack.

Monday, July 3
Minsk Falls to Reds
Red army Monday captured Minsk capital of White Russia, and opened the ancient invasion route westward. The Russians were only 190 miles from the German soil of East Prussia.

Yanks Open New Attack
American forces struck southward at the base of the Cherbourg peninsula Monday in what was believed to herald a major push across the entire width of the Normandy front.

German Defense Broken
Allied troops broke open the German defense across the Italian peninsula Monday, capturing key highway center of Siena and driving up the coast toward seaports of Livorno and Ancona.

Tuesday, July 4
Jap Ships Sunk
Yank carrier planes celebrated the Fourth of July by sinking five Jap ships, damaging several others, firing harbor installations and warehouses and destroying 25 enemy airplanes in a raid on Iwo Jima and Haha Jimja in the Volcano islands.

Yanks Enter La Haye
U. S. troops, supported by a heavy artillery barrage, Tuesday captured the last ridge overlooking the tottering German west Normandy anchor of La Haye. Heavy fighting was raging along a 20-mile front from Carrentan to the sea on the west side of the Cherbourg peninsula.

Reds Take Polotsk
Russian troops captured Polotsk in White Russia Tuesday. Other red troops drove 37 miles west to point at a spearhead at the ancient Polish city of Wilno.

Wednesday, July 5
Yanks Capture La Haye
American shock troops drove into La Haye Wednesday, capturing the railroad station and slashed forward in violent street fighting within 300 yards of the center of town. Germans were counter-attacking but the U. S. lines held.

Allies Advance in Italy
Eighth army troops drove within five miles of the important communications center of Arezzo on the road to Florence in Italy Wednesday.

**Treatment of Jar
Rubbers Outlined**

Jar rings have a definite odor of rubber this year. To eliminate this, the U. S. D. A. extension service suggests this treatment for any jar ring purchased in 1944.

Expose jar rings to open air from 20 to 24 hours. Then when ready to use, boil one dozen rings for not less than 15 minutes in a solution of one quart of water and one tablespoon of baking soda after which boil rings in fresh water for an additional five minutes; then use.
