Price Ceiling Set on Melons
New price ceilings for watermelons and cents-per-pound markups for other melons, sweet peppers and hothouse cucumbers became effective Wednesday. At the same time a limit of forty per cent markup to retailers was placed on fresh ready-to-cook packaged vegetables. The price of watermelons in this district will be \$35 per ton plus freight which will bring the retail to approximately four and one-half cents per pound.

Pickled Cherry Recipe Given
Though sour cherries are generally canned for use in pie and other cherry desserts, a few may be preserved or put up as relishes. One of the best cherry relishes is pickled cherries. To make Wash and pit large, sour red cherries. To each quart add three-fourths of their weight of sugar. Sprinkle the sugar over the fruit in layers and let stand overnight. In the morning stir until the sugar dissolves. Then press the juice from the cherries. Tie a quantity of whole spices (cinnamon, allspice, and a few cloves) in a loose cheesecloth bag, drop the bag into the juice, and boil the juice down to about three-fourths of the original quantity. Remove the spices, pour the hot syrup over the drained cherries and add two tablespoons of vinegar to each pint. Seal and let stand about two weeks to blend before using.
