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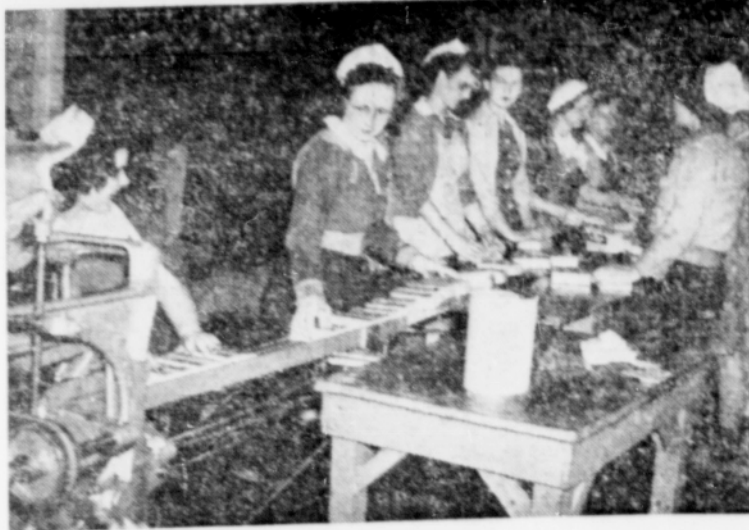

Washington County Women Given Credit for Saving Spinach Crop

Credit for canning the spinach crop without loss in spite of the man-power shortage, canning women of Washington county. During two weeks 1600 tons of spinach went through the canning and freezing plant of B. E. Maling, Inc. here—almost a third more than last year when help shortage caused tons of spinach to mould in the crates.

Secret of success was the door to door and farm house to farm house campaign conducted at the start of the season by the U. S. employment officer and a crew of five women led by Pearl Long.

When Washington county women learned that the call to save the crop came direct from the government they responded heartily. They "left their own canning, packed the children off to grandmothers and marched into the cannery like an army of commandos."

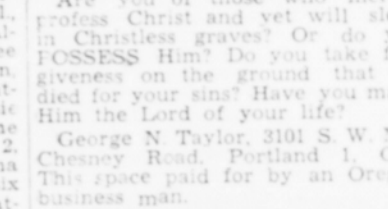
