Traffic Death Rate the Same

Oregon's traffic death rate for the first five months of 1944 was 8 persons killed per 100 million miles of travel, exactly the same as for the same period in 1943, according to Secretary of State Bob Farrell.

The traffic death rate is the unit of measurement used in determining the relative safety of traffic in relation to the exposure to accident. Travel in Oregon, as shown by gasoline consumption, was slightly higher for the first 5 months of this year than in the comparative period of 1943. Mileage this year totaled 981,619,509 miles, an increase of 4 per cent over the total of 938,000,705 miles for the first 5 months of 1943.

Death rate for the month of May this year was 8 persons killed per 100 million miles of travel. The month with the lowest rate so far this year was April with a rate of 5.

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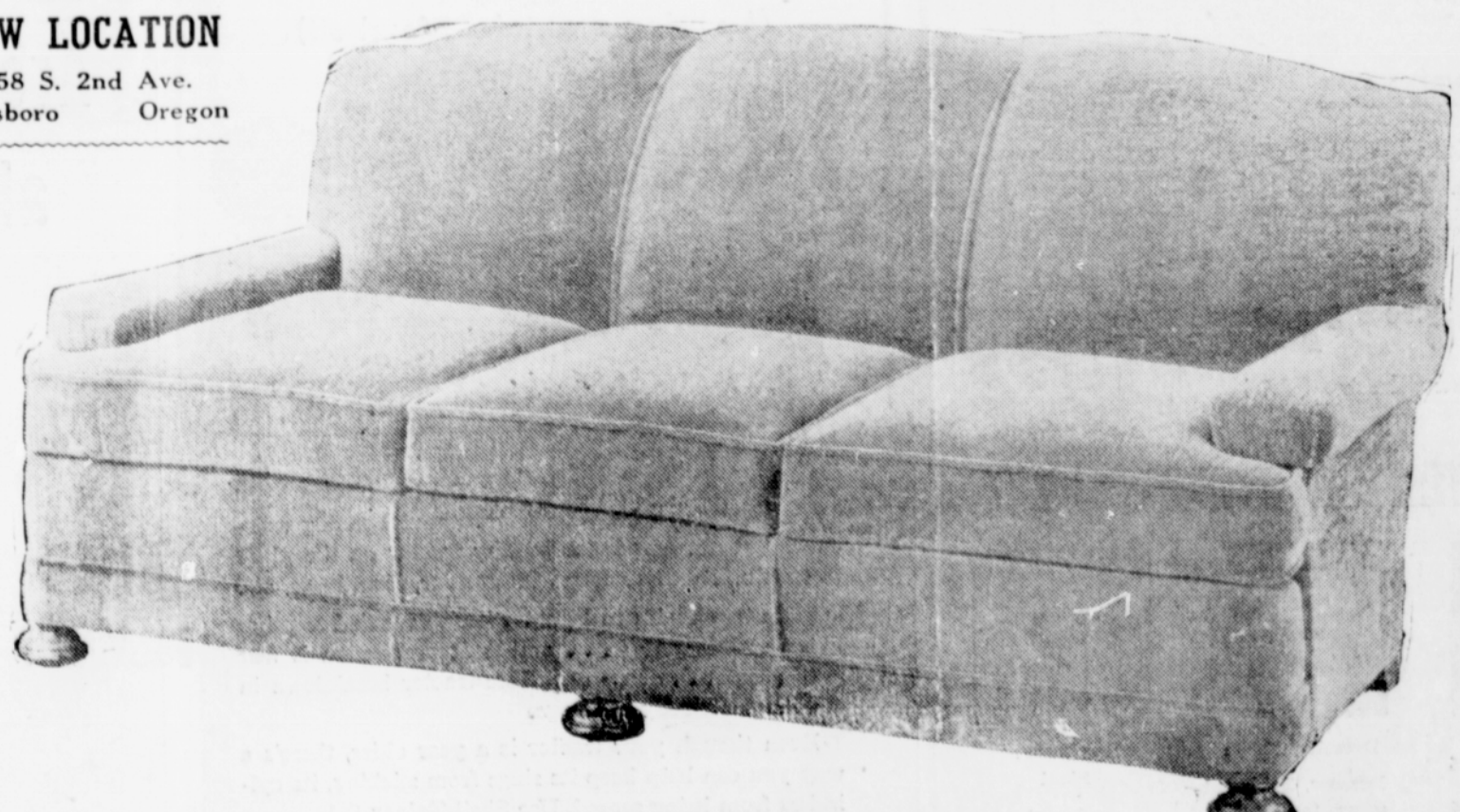
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
