

Schefflin Man Gets Purple Heart in Italy

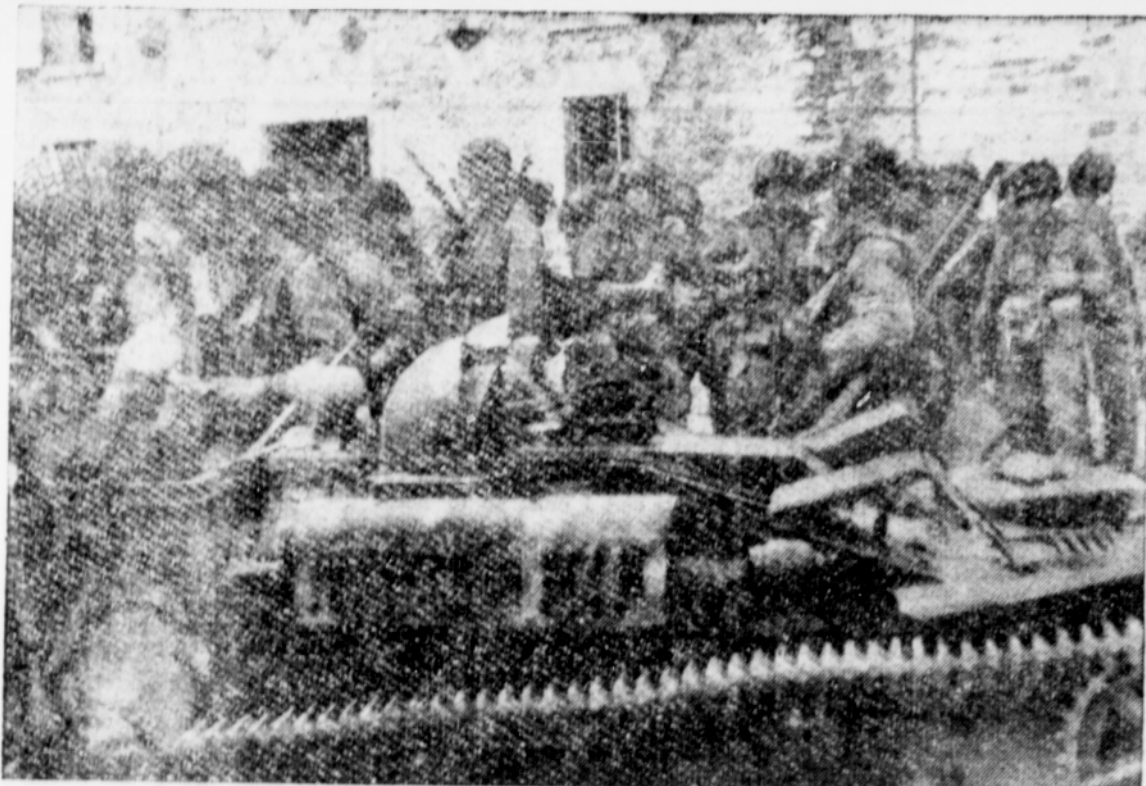
