Mrs. America Meets the War

Editor's Note: War touches every home in every way. This column is devoted to the war and the war will affect Mrs. America and her home.

Mrs. America has the first of the month blues but not the usual tidings from her creditors. Now she has 50 blue ration points validated on the first day of each calendar month. The 5 stamps, each worth 10 points, validated on August 1, are B5, C5, D5, E5, and F5, in ration book 4. All of these stamps may be used indefinitely.

And now here's the real red. 3 more red ration stamps each worth 10 points are good for buying rationed meats and fats. They are A5, B5, C5, in ration book 4. These 3 stamps represent Mrs. America's quota of red points for the period July 29 to August 27. Need to run a washing machine or vacuum cleaner? When you do, pay attention to the ceiling prices on the ration charge. The highest price you can be charged legally for renting a vacuum cleaner is \$1.25 per month or for any fraction of a month. Maximum rates are established for all rentals of used household washing machines, with or without meters.

Here is more good news for shoppers buying fresh pears for the family. Price ceilings have been set for the first time for fresh pears sold for table use. This means a reduction of about 20 per cent from last year's retail prices.

When your service man comes home on a leave or furlough of at least 3 days he'll be able to get one gallon of gasoline for every day he's away up to a maximum of 30 days. To get his ration, the service man applies to the war price and rationing board having jurisdiction over the car. He expects to drive. He is required to present his furlough or leave papers. No ration will be granted for passes, liberties of any duration or for leaves and furloughs of less than 3 days.

Don't overlook that certificate of transfer when you buy a used car, either from a dealer or a private individual. This official form must be filled out and signed by both buyer and seller. Another important point for the buyer to remember is the necessity of presenting the certificate to the local war price and rationing board before making application for the gas ration for the car.

Add to shopper's notes for August, several summer favorites in canned meats will be selling for about 10 per cent less than at present. Canned and whole ham, smoked and unsmoked, as well as spiced luncheon meat, spiced and pressed ham and pressed pork are among the canned meats coming down in price. The reductions will result when new ceiling prices go into effect August 4.

Mrs. America should be able to see more of the canned foods she buys. The war production board has authorized unlimited use of glass containers for the packing of most foods, drugs and health supplies. And the WPB says that sufficient metal tops will be available.



able or the increased quantity of jars and bottles.

And here's another note on the packaging situation, but it is not so encouraging. The manufacture of paper milk containers has been placed under regulation limiting the dealer's inventory. As a matter of fact, the production of other food containers made of paper is also under reserve production control. The war production board further reports that the present critical paper shortage shows no sign of abating.

Don't forget that your butcher still is authorized to pay you 2 red points and 4 cents for each pound of waste kitchen fat turned in. It's a profitable deal either way you look at it. Mrs. America can use the salvage points to spread ration budget, and Uncle Sam can use the salvage fats in the manufacture of explosives, drugs and other war materials.

Here's information for folks living in a defense rental area. Nothing in the new price control bill permits the landlord to charge more than he has been charging without an order from the area rent director. Any rent increases not made by the OPA rent office are illegal. If rent is raised, without an official order, tenants are advised not to pay the additional charge before getting in touch with the rent office.

It's a wise housewife who checks with the price panel of her war price and rationing board before buying or selling a used refrigerator, vacuum cleaner, washing machine or metal coil bed springs. These used articles are under price ceilings whether sold by the individual householder or a dealer.
