G. I. Writes of "Sunshine State," Former News Editor in Florida

Editor's Note: The following is one of a series of articles written by Lt. Ed O'Meara, former Argus editor, now stationed in Florida with the army air force. He served for nearly a year in Greenland.

ORLANDO, Florida

Once again this ex-Argusite finds himself located through the courtesy of fate and activities of the Air force in Florida, America's self-styled "Sunshine State."

Florida more than lives up to its shining nickname, but in its shining climate, there is a good deal of rain. The average summer day in this vicinity is punctuated by a late-afternoon squally spell, a rattling good thunder-and-lightning display and heavy driving rain. After six months in this "Sunshine State," a person ought to be getting used to Florida and its weather, but I'm not acclimated yet. Fact is, a person can be sitting quietly and suddenly exude more triple-distilled perspiration than a man feeding a hater from a strawstack in the middle of the Tulelake Valley's hot summer days. Or almost.

Florida's nice spot for winter touring and vacationing, but I don't think many of the chamber of commerce boys down here would try to ambush me if I reported that it gets pretty hot and goey in summer. So if you draw a sizeable vacation (spelling of post-war possibilities, of course), and it happens to be summertime, consider first something like a series of summer days from Cooper Mountain, or Bald Peak, or the Canadian Rockies. If it's wintertime, then maybe Florida. I've enjoyed the country of Uncle Sam, this former Washington countyite has been located in three different spots in Florida at intervals during the past two and a half years. Back in 1942 it was my lot to be bivouaced in the fabulous, ornate and beautiful Boca Raton club—landscaped grounds, surrounded by tennis courts, a 36-hole topnotch golf course, swimming pools and the always-present palm trees. Back in its halcyon pre-war days, a year's membership included no room fees, cost \$5000. When I was there, even the lowest private (which I was) drew \$50 a month for staying there.

Currently, Florida's enjoying something of a real-estate boom, though not quite the same hysterical proportions as in the twenties. There are "monuments" still around bearing testimony to those earlier land-buying days. In several places I've found elaborately laid-out city sites, with paved streets and sidewalks, overgrown now with grass and weeds, with sizeable pine trees sprouting up through blacktop pavement of some long-unused avenues. They're reminiscent of but far more costly than the relics of old-time logging camps such as are found in Oregon's coast-range mountains. On one occasion, while on Florida leave, I found a location miles from anywhere, we found ourselves stumbling through some semi-tropic jungleland into a forgotten area replete with streets, sidewalks and tall, white lampposts and a few buildings, crumbling away—but no people, no houses, no buildings. Apparently they worked in reverse of Northwest methods—laying out the town first and building everything but the homes, which never came.

Among other things: During my two-month 1942 stay, I saw less oranges in Florida than one usually finds on Main street fruit stands in Hillsboro. This time, someone re-routed highways or something and the golden-speckled

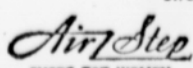

3/4 Cup Juice
4 1/2 Cup Sugar
1/4 Cup Lemon Juice
1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

Wash 3 quarts of fully ripe berries. Crush thoroughly and squeeze out the juice. Measure exactly 3/4 cups of the juice (add water to fill last cup, if necessary) into a large kettle. Add the M.C.P. Pectin and lemon juice, stir well, bring to a boil, stirring constantly. NOW, add the sugar (which has been previously measured), continue stirring, and bring to a full rolling boil. BOIL EXACTLY 2 MINUTES. Remove from fire, let boil subside, skim. Pour into sterilized glasses, allowing 1/2-inch space for sealing with fresh paraffin.
