Mrs. Luechauer Dies Suddenly

Miss Anna Marie Luechauer died suddenly early Thursday morning following a heart attack at the home of her son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. William Martin, at Forest Hills golf course last Thursday.

Mrs. Luechauer was affectionately known as "Grandma" to Forest Hills golfers. She made her home with her daughter's family at the golf club for 17 years.

She was born in Cincinnati, Ohio, November 1, 1863. Deceased is survived by the following children: Mrs. Huldah Martin, route 2, Cornelius; Mrs. Salome C. Harvey, Seaside; Alvin A. and Aaron G. Luechauer, Cincinnati, Ohio. A sister, Mrs. George Schiele of Cincinnati also survives. Mrs. Martin accompanied the remains to Cincinnati for burial.

Enlistment in Guard is Urged

Eligible men in five states of the Ninth Service Command—Washington, Oregon, Idaho, California, and Utah—are urged by Major General David McCosch, Jr., commanding general, at his command headquarters at Fort Douglas, Utah, to join the state guards of their respective states.

General McCosch paid high tribute to "the excellent work accomplished by state guard units in dealing with disaster, relief throughout the country during the past few weeks."

He recalled the vital assistance given by various state guard units during recent forest fires in the New England states, the destructive tornado in Pennsylvania and West Virginia and the circus fire in Connecticut.

"Local communities are looking more and more to the state guard for assistance in time of emergency," General McCosch stated.

Age and physical qualifications vary for enrollment in active state guard organizations. Interested persons should contact the adjutant general of their particular state who can be reached at the state capital.

Men honorably discharged from the army are eligible for enrollment.

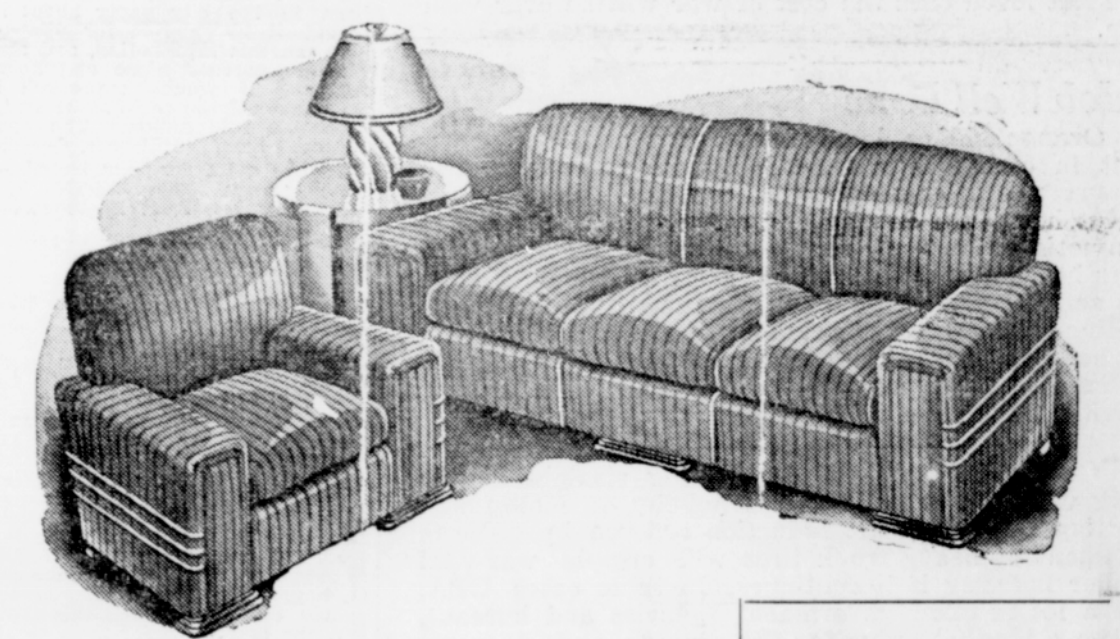
Sugar Restoration

Consumers may apply to their local war price and rationing boards for certificates for use in replacement of sugar that is lost, damaged, destroyed or stolen. Willard Case, district OPA food rationing officer, announced today. The action becomes effective August 2.

OPA regulations already contain provisions for issuance of ration certificates for replacement of lost, damaged, destroyed or stolen meats, cheeses, butter, processed foods and other rationed food items, and today's action makes similar provision for replacing lost sugar, Case pointed out.

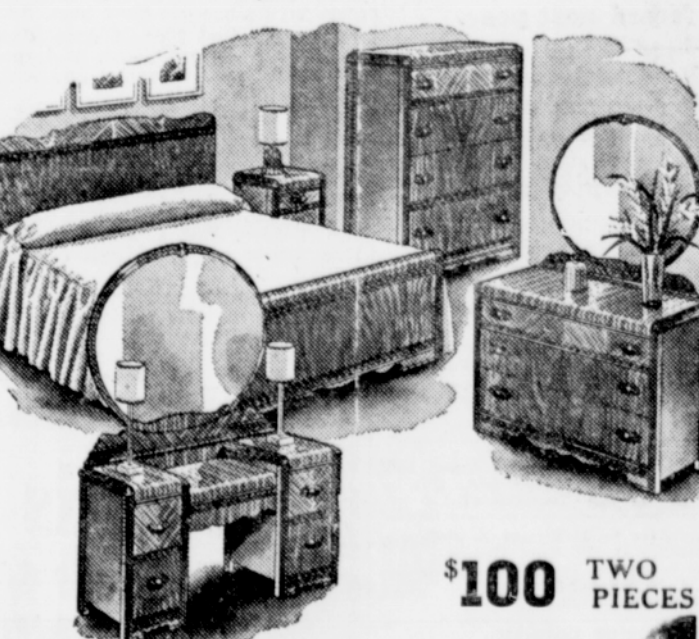

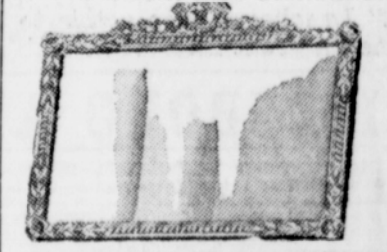
