Christmas mail for members of the merchant marine should also be mailed between September 15 and October 15 if delivery by December 25 is desired.

Hard candies, nuts, caramels (including those covered with chocolate), fruit cake, and chocolate bars individually wrapped in waxed paper, should be enclosed in inner boxes of wood, metal, or other non-combustible material.

Sealed packages of candy, cigars, tobacco, and toilet articles in simplest, noncombustible form may be placed in parcels without affecting the parcel-post classification of such packages.

Sharp-pointed or sharp-edged instruments, such as razors, knives, etc., must have their points or edges protected so they cannot cut through the wrapping and damage other parcels.
