over the mud when he first arrived on the island. Most of them were one-way with by-passes, sometimes the log roads caved in and the trucks bogged down. On these occasions the adjectives used by the drivers in describing the mud were colorful, to say the least.

Peppard was high in his praise for the little jeeps—"blitz bugs" as they're called in the South Pacific. "They'll come through almost any kind of conditions," he declared.

The soldier's three-year-old son Jack was probably the most enthusiastic of the veterans' well-comers. Jack was just a little under a year old when his father saw him last, but the youngster recognized him from his pictures. "These kids sure know their stuff," Peppard declared. "The boy's first question was 'have you got any money?'"

Peppard, a former member of the Forest Grove national guard infantry company, was in New Guinea almost a year as a truck driver and the last six months with a line company. He had one combat assignment during that time. Recalling this experience, he declared he was thankful Jag "ack-ack" guns can't shoot around corners. His company was digging in one day when the Japs got their range and started dropping shells close by, but couldn't get around the hill that protected the Yanks.

Perhaps his most vivid recollection was of setting himself on fire one night while on guard duty. He poured gasoline on his feet, got some on his clothes and burned his right leg. His experience cost him a stay in the hospital.

Peppard left for Australia with his unit in April, 1942. The Australians are very friendly people and the Australian girls are OK, he said. However, he thinks American girls are better and he's sold on Oregon as the best spot in the world. He expressed appreciation for the welcome word from home he received through the Argus. The young soldier is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John H. Peppard of Banks and nephew of Jim Peppard of Hillsboro.
